

# Bunning And Simmons To Start All-Star Game

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Jim Bunning, a lanky Detroit righthander with a shiny 10-2 record, will start today's all-star game for the American League against Curt Simmons, Philadelphia's rejuvenated lefthanded ace.

Manager Casey Stengel selected Bunning over Billy Loes of Baltimore among his righthanders after learning that Cleveland's Early Wynn pitched Sunday. This is Bunning's first all-star game. Stengel said he "would have possibly pitched Wynn" if he hadn't worked Sunday and he sounded off against the practice of using all-star pitchers as starters in the weekend before the game.

"No all-star pitcher should be permitted to start in the last two (playing) days before the game," he said. "You pick your pitchers a week ahead and they pitch them a day ahead."

The National League, still trailing 13-10 in the series, has won six of the last seven games and Stengel has lost five of six. However, Stengel wouldn't accept a reporter's bait and refused to be quoted as saying he was "sick and tired of losing." Naturally, he isn't happy about the record which is in sharp contrast with his pennant and world series success.

Dave Grote National League service bureau chief, announced Simmons as the starter.

**TWO OTHER GAMES**

Curt has pitched in two all-star games, starting in 1952, the year rain halted play after five innings at Philadelphia.

With St. Louis bug-eyed over baseball, due to the Cardinals' sprint, all tickets for the Busch Stadium game were gobbled up long ago. A capacity crowd of 31,000 was assured. One report said scalpers were asking \$40 for a \$4 ticket with few to be had.

The weatherman predicted a sunny afternoon with temperatures in the 80s by game time, scheduled for 2:30 p.m. AST.

The radio and television people who pay \$3,250,000 for the all-star and world series each year under a new contract, will beam the game from coast to coast. Sixty per cent of the radio-TV cash and the estimated receipts of \$125,000 go to the player pension fund.

Choice of Simmons, who was paid \$65,000 to sign with the Phils in 1947, was no surprise. Alston had said he would use a lefty against the Americans' lefthanded batting power. The 27-year-old Phil has an 8-4 record in his second year of a "comeback" after shoulder trouble threatened to end his career two springs ago. In fact, Simmons went to spring training in 1956 with no contract and wasn't actually signed until he proved he could throw.

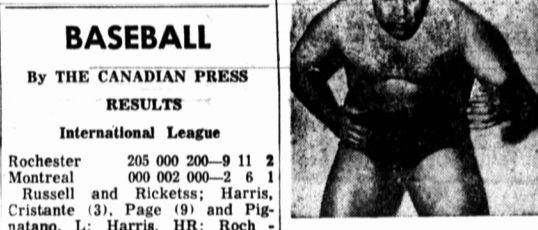

## Jim Bunning And Bob Pinkey Lead In Earned Runs Division

NEW YORK (AP)—Righthander Jim Bunning of Detroit Tigers and Bob Pinkey of Pittsburgh Pirates, each starting for a second-division ball club, are the mid-season leaders in the major league earned run competition.

Figures by The Associated Press showed Monday that Bunning paces the American League with an earned run mark of 2.63. He has won 10 games and lost only two. A 6-3, 165-pounder who relies mainly on his fastball, Bunning has allowed 28 earned runs in 124 innings.

Pinkey has permitted 21 earned runs in 101 frames for a National League leading figure of 2.76. Bob has won eight games—the most on the seventh-place Pirates—and lost seven. He has pitched one shut-out against New York Giants.

Bob Shantz, who is making a spectacular comeback with New York Yankees, is runner-up to Bunning in the American League. The

# Moore Must Sign Today Or Else

NEW YORK (AP)—Archie Moore, was given an extra day's grace Monday to sign for a defence of his light heavyweight title before he is shorn of the crown.

Julius Helfand, chairman of the World Championship Boxing Committee, decided that Moore really was negotiating seriously in Los Angeles for a title defence against Tony Anthony and therefore rated a reprieve until noon today.

Helfand said he received a call from Los Angeles from Ernie Braca, Anthony's manager, and Jules Covey, representing singer Frank Sinatra, that they were working on a contract and expected to make the deal.

"Since they" said they were working in good faith on the fight, I said I would expect a call from them at 9 a.m. their time (noon in New York) with the word that the fight had been decided.

Moore, the graybeard of the championship ranks at 40, give or take a few years, hasn't defended his title since he knocked out Yolande Pompey 13 months ago.

**ACTION AUTOMATIC**

The world committee announced in Paris if he did not sign to defend Anthony by Sunday he would lose his title.

Helfand said the action was automatic. But Monday, he said that since July 7 fell on Sunday, he would give Moore until Monday night.

The call from Los Angeles persuaded him to give old Archie an extra day of grace.

The world committee has decided, should Moore fail to come through, Anthony will fight either Pompay or Harold Johnson for the title. The winner then would have to fight the other for the crown within 90 days.

Moore has been saying all along that he'd just love to fight someone for the title, but that he requires a \$100,000 guarantee. No one has been willing to fork over that much.
