[m 7 10i] A GREATLY increased quantity of coal is to be sent from the Nova Scotia mines this season to Montreal. THE Rev. J. Watson Smith, will take the place of the Rev. D. D. Currie as editor of the Wesleyan. THE brig Brenda, Capt. Finlayson, to Peake Bros. & Co., with salt and general merchandise, from Liverpool, arrived here on the 8th inst. THE Bay of Fundy winter boat Scud, will take the place of the Albert, on the route between Picton and Magdalen Islands this summer. FOUR schooners are loading with potatoes here, at prices we are really ashamed to mention. We hope the present crisis in the produce market will induce people to look round for some other way of using their surplus potatoes than selling them for fourteen cents a bushel.—Pioneer. IN the municipal elections in Picton, on the 4th inst., J. D. McLeod was re-elected Mayor without opposition. In Ward 1, W. J. Lorraine was elected Councillor, by 60 votes to 12 for Mr. James McRae. In Ward 2, J. E. Paulin got 44 votes and George P. Harris 32. In Ward 3, M. Morrison was elected without opposition. A BREEZE.—A breeze of excitement was created yesterday evening over the report that Mayor Dawson did not nominate within the time set forth by the new Act, and that John Murphy, Esq., would, therefore, be the coming Mayor. We learn upon enquiry at the Clerks office, that Mayor Dawson nominated and paid the proper fee at 3.55 o'clock, p. m., and Mr. Murphy nominated at 3.56 p. m. CAPTAIN KIRWIN, lately editor of the Evening Post, Montreal, and who has been residing at Ottawa for some time, has left for Chicago, where he intends to reside in future. Captain Kirwin was captain commanding of the Irish contingent in the service of France during the Franco-German war. He was also one of the first men in Ireland to join the Home Rule movement when the position was rendered vacant by the death of the late Mr. John Martin, M. P. BODY FOUND.—The body of a middle-aged man was last Wednesday found near the shore of Brudenell River, about three miles from this place. The appearance of the remains would indicate that they had been exposed for a month or two, and the supposition is that deceased had perished in one of the snow storms during the latter part of winter. A bottle with a small quantity of liquor, was found at some little distance, but of course, no one can say whether it had been the property of the victim or not.—Pioneer. LAUNCHED.—From the shipyard of David Egan, Mount Stewart, on Tuesday, the 4th inst., a very handsome and well-finished schooner, of about 90 tons, named the "Minnie E." The above vessel has been built from a very handsome model, and the workmanship throughout has been done in Mr. Ronald McDonald's best style, and reflects much credit on that gentleman as a master builder. The "Minnie E" is now loading potatoes at Mount Stewart, for the Newfoundland market, and will be commanded by Captain Robert Anderson, of St. Peters.

THE brig "S. A. Snow" arrived at Boston, as previously reported, on the 21st ult., with old iron from Demerara. The stevedores estimated her output at 300 tons. During her passage she experienced heavy weather, and though she tilted very heavily, there was no perceptible straining, proving her strength of build. She had been decked and copper-painted at Boston and her bottom found in perfect order. The "Snow" is now taking a load of flour, etc., to Charlottetown, P. E. I., where she has been chartered to load potatoes and oats for the United Kingdom or France. Her charter is a round sum in the neighborhood of £500 sterling, with option of purchase by the charterers. The "S. A. Snow" is at present owned by Messrs. Forsyth & Hart, Halifax.
