GENERAL GARFIELD FOR PRESIDENT. — GENERAL ARTHUR FOR VICE PRESIDENT!

CHICAGO, June 8.

General James A. Garfield, who secured the Republican nomination yesterday, like Grant, has been a military man. He is at

present a member of the National House of Representatives, and unless inaugurated as President on March 4, 1881, will take his seat as Senator from Ohio, now occupied by General Thurman.

Chester A. Arthur, of New York, who secured the Republican nomination for Vice-President on the first ballot, is an ex-Collector of Customs for New York. He was removed by the Hayes administration and is not greatly known.

Supreme Court, Prince County.

The Court opened at ten o'clock this morning. In the case of Thompson vs. Ottaway and others, which occupied the Court all the afternoon of yesterday, judgment in favor of the plaintiff was agreed to by the parties.

The first criminal case was the Queen at the prosecution of John Ramsay against LeMaible Arsenaux, indictment for house-breaking. The prisoner pleaded guilty, and was remanded to await sentence.

The Queen vs. Patrick Shavin, for assault on a Peace Officer. The jury brought in a verdict of not guilty. On motion of R. Shaw, Esq., counsel for the prisoner, he was discharged. The Attorney General for the prosecution.

The Queen at the prosecution of John McMillan against John Francis McKinnon, indictment for larceny. The prisoner was acquitted.

There is still some business before the Grand Jury. It is expected they will be discharged to-day.
