In concluding Dr. Mackenzie said that "we can leave in God's hand the hour of His coming but it is our opportunity and responsibility to pray, so that politics, business and social life will be an answer to the cry of the prayer, "Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven." Morning hymns were "How Lovely Are Thy Dwellings Fair", "Father We Thank Thee For The Night", and "O Come All Ye Faithful". Special music included the anthem "Who Is He In Yonder Stall". At the evening service hymns were "I To The Hills", "Take Time To Be Holy" and "Light Of The Lonely Pilgrims Heart". The anthem was "O Home Of God Still Keep Me".

At the Court House in Georgetown yesterday morning, Mr. Harvey Douglas, Liberal candidate in the Provincial by-election on Dec. 4 for Assemblyman in the Second District of King's, was declared elected by Sheriff J. Edwin Reid of Rollo Bay, after the official counting of the ballots which gave a total of 1034 votes for Mr. Douglas and a total of 788-votes for his Conservative opponent, Mr. Milton Rogerson, leaving Mr. Douglas with a majority of 248.
