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**Department of Agriculture Being Revamped At Ottawa**  
Ottawa — A general reorganization of the Canada Department of Agriculture is being undertaken and should be fully in effect by April 1, 1959... beginning of the fiscal year, the Honorable Douglas S. Harkness, Minister of Agriculture has announced.  
The plan envisages:  
1. A research Branch, to incorporate all units of the present Experimental Farms and Science Services into one efficient research organization.  
**TEAM APPROACH**  
This will bring the "team" approach to the solution of a given problem... something toward which departmental scientists have been trending more and more in recent years but which unified administration and programming will make easier.  
2. A Production and Marketing Branch to bring similarly under one head the regulatory work of grading and inspection heretofore performed by the Production and Marketing Services. This branch will also include Price Stabilization and such other activities as may be undertaken by the Department to help solve problems arising in this general economic field.  
3. An Administration Branch to embrace Organization and Personnel, Property and Finance and the present Information Service and Economics Division. These units serve all branches of the Department.  
**MARSHLAND**  
A fourth branch may be formed to include Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Administration, Prairie Farm Assistance Administration, Maritime Marshland Rehabilitation Administration, and any future activities in the conservation field.

**CONTRACT BRIDGE**

The bidding:  
South West North East  
1 ♠ Pass 2 ♣ Pass

Opening lead—jack of hearts.  
In the annual National Intercollegiate Bridge Tournament staged earlier this year simultaneously at 97 colleges throughout the country, this hand was given as a test of defensive skill.  
It was expected that most pairs would reach a final contract of four spades, and this, in fact, occurred.  
The normal heart lead was won by the king, and the result of the hand depended largely on what happened at trick two.  
Obviously, East has to return a diamond, considering the dummy he is looking at. The first

problem is which diamond to play.  
The correct return is the eight of diamonds. Ordinarily, with a four-card suit, a defender would lead his fourth best card, in this case the three.  
The purpose, in following this convention, is to inform partner of the number of cards held in the suit led. In most cases this information is vital to the other defender, since it enables him to know how many cards declarer has in the suit.  
But this principle of defense has its exceptions. Where it is more important to notify partner of the quality of the suit played than the quantity, a departure from the usual practice is made. With a weak holding that cannot stand the return of the suit the highest card is led.  
The eight of diamonds is therefore returned and South plays to a trick. He must allow the king to win. If he does not, declarer makes the contract.  
If West ducks the diamond king, as he should because East led the eight, South is defeated.  
Whenever, later in the play, East comes into the lead with the king of clubs, he returns a diamond to cue declarer's goose.  
And West should realize at trick two that unless East has a high club there is no hope of beating the contract.

**Bomb Scare At Peace Tower**  
OTTAWA (CP)—Police guards combed the Parliament building Peace Tower and kept a wary eye on parcel-carrying tourists Tuesday after receiving a crudely-penned letter saying a time bomb was in the tower and set to explode at 6 p.m. EDT.  
The deadline passed with no blast.  
House of Commons security officers had already labelled the letter, mailed to the Ottawa Citizen and relayed to the RCMP, as the work of a crank.  
But they took no chances.

**Bridegroom With 'Bomb' Ends In Jail**  
LOS ANGELES (AP)—A bridegroom who threatened to blow up a downtown department store unless paid \$20,000 is honey-mooning alone in jail, police said Tuesday.  
They said Paul Gerz of Kitchener, Ont., walked into the store Monday carrying a ticking package. He told store officials it was a bomb set to explode unless he was paid the money.  
For an hour he sat with executives in an office. The ticking package was at his feet. A squad of police waited outside.  
Finally Gerz tried to leave. He was met at the door by Detective Joe Le Monica who rushed a revolver into his stomach and said: "If anyone's going to do any blasting around here, it's going to be me."
