Opposition Leadership.

Mr. Laurier's Contemplated Retirement.

TORONTO, July 26. The following despatch was sent all over Ontario last evening from Montreal: "Mr Laurier is seriously considering retirement from the leadership of the Liberal party. It is well known that Mr. Laurier has for a long time been dissatisfied with party prospects. He does not think he is receiving the support he should from Ontario. Mr. Laurier is also a comparatively poor man, and he finds it hard to give his time to the party and to attend to the practice of his profession. The only reason why he has not given up the leadership long ago is that he was afraid he might be accused of deserting his party in a crisis. It is very likely that, if the Liberal convention is called, Mr. Laurier will ask the party representatives to choose a new leader. Mr. Laurier will shortly take up his residence in Montreal, where he will practice his profession."

Halifax Happenings.

The Prohibition Commission.

HALIFAX, July 26. H. M. S. Blake will start for Charlottetown on Friday, 29th. The cricket match, Wanderers vs. Philadelphia, commenced yesterday. The Wanderers made 46 in the first innings, while the visitors scored 164. The Wanderers in the second innings made 20 for three out.
