

Local and Other Items.

PERSONAL.—Lieutenant Hazard, of H. M. S. Terror, Bermuda, is visiting his relatives and friends in this city. He will remain about six weeks.

DRILL AND INSPECTION.—The Charlottetown Engineer Corps will meet for drill at the Drill Shed to-morrow evening. The inspection will be at an early date.

NAVAL.—H. M. S. Pylades arrived here from Halifax via Georgetown yesterday afternoon. The Pylades is 1420 tons, and carries fourteen guns. She sails again on Thursday.

DEATH OF AN ACTOR.—Mr. H. W. Farrah, who played in Charlottetown several times with Webber's Boston Comedy Co., died at Winthrop, Me., last week, aged thirty-four years.

LARGE TROUT.—Mr. W. A. Hawley, of this city, caught the large trout of the season in the Montague River on Saturday evening last. The trout, we are informed, weighed just five pounds when landed, measured sixteen inches in length, girthed fourteen inches, and boasted of a tail six inches broad. The trout was forwarded to Mr. S. D. Fraser, of the Rocklin House.

FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Bonavista, Captain Anderson, arrived here from Montreal about noon to-day, with a cargo of general merchandise and Mr. W. F. Vilas, Mrs. Vilas, Mr. Geo. Hyde, Mrs. Geo. Hyde, Miss Hyde and Mr. W. D. Brander as passengers for this port. The Bonavista will load with cattle, sheep, potatoes, hay, etc., and leave for St. John's, Nfld., early to-morrow morning.

He wishes us to state that he does not emphasize one command more than another. All are necessary and none are non-essential.

THE TRIP.—Arrangements have been made for a meeting at the Halifax Riding Grounds on September 20th. The principal event is to be a steeple chase for a purse of \$500, divided into prizes of \$300, \$150, and \$50, for all horses which have made a regular stud season in the Maritime Provinces this year. The entrance fee for this race will be the usual 10 per cent. of the purse, and will be made in two payments, \$20 on August 1st, when the entries close, and the balance on Thursday, Sept. 13th. Six entries and four starters will be required. There will also be a race for the three-minute class, for a purse of \$150, and a race for ponies, 14 1 and a silver cup.

COULDN'T GET HER OFF.—Efforts to get off the schr. Volant, of Montreal, stranded at Souris last fall, have proved unavailing. Mr. J. G. Sterns was the first purchaser of this wreck. He sold out to Mr. Kinsman, who has been engaged for some time back in trying to float her, but gave it up after spending considerable time and money. Mr. Kinsman is highly spoken of by those with whom he had dealings while at Souris. Although his venture in the wreck business resulted in disappointment, he paid off without a murmur every man he owed a dollar to that was employed about the wreck. Those acquainted with the circumstances express regret that such a plucky fellow as he showed himself to be, met with such ill luck.

THE PICTOU ELECTION.

Hon. Charles Tupper ELECTED BY ACCLAMATION.

HALIFAX, N. S., June 18.

Hon. Charles Tupper was elected in Pictou to-day by acclamation. A large number of sturdy yeomen proceeded to Pictou town to-day to witness the nomination proceedings. The contest was so hopeless that the Liberals, who had been beaten so often, did not nominate even a dummy candidate, and Hon. Mr. Tupper, Minister of Fisheries, was returned by acclamation.

In his address to the electors Hon. Mr. Tupper said he had visited all sections of the county, and could accurately gauge public sentiment. Had there been a contest he would have been elected by an overwhelming majority. Mr. McDougald also spoke.

Presbyterian Conference.

SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS.

HALIFAX, June 18.

The Assembly to-day discussed the statistical report.

The important work of city missions was discussed and referred to Presbyteries.

Dr. Robertson presented the report of the North-west Church and Manse Building fund.

The committee appointed last year to meet a committee of the House of Bishops to discuss the feasibility of the union of the Episcopal and Presbyterian churches, reported that they had failed to secure a meeting, but had arranged for one in October.

The Assembly decided to meet next year in St. Andrew's Church, Toronto.

To-night the question of French Evangelization was discussed by Prof. Scrimger, Dr. Armstrong, Dr. Doudit, Rev. Mr. Chiniquy and others.

It was decided to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the revolution of 1688 on the 4th of Nov. next.

THE NEW STEAMER.

To Succeed the Northern Light.

OTTAWA, June 18.

A contract has been entered into with Elder & Co., of Glasgow, for the construction of a steel steamer to replace the Northern Light. The specifications require that she shall be 200 tons burden, built of Stems Martin steel throughout, fitted with triple expansion engine and capable of a speed of 15 knots an hour. She will be built on the Swedish iceboat model and completed by Nov. 1st.

Another Disastrous Fire.

DUBOIS, Pa., June 18.

Fire started in a bake house at 10 p. m., and quickly burned over a mile long and from a quarter to half a mile wide. Loss \$500,000 to \$1,000,000. About 400 people are homeless and destitute, and need immediate relief. The insurance is very light. A gale of wind swept the fire along the streets like a cyclone.

Guilty of Perjury.

MONTREAL, June 18.

The judgment against Downie, a lawyer of this city, found guilty of perjury, has been sustained by the Supreme Court. Downie failed to appear for sentence this morning, and is supposed to have left the country. His bail, \$1,200, was estreated, and a bench warrant for him issued.

A New Judge.

Murray Dodd, Q. C., has been appointed County Court Judge for the district of Cape Breton, vice Judge Tremaine, who has resigned owing to ill health.

Sixteen new locomotives for the Intercolonial Railway are now under construction at the Kingston Engine Works.

The Windsor Hotel Company, of Montreal, have added \$150,000 stock to build a grand banquet and music hall.

An Order-in-Council was passed to-day, authorizing the sale of the old penitentiary property at Halifax to Archdeacon Gilpin for \$10,000.
