

THE CITY SCHOOLS. Midsummer Examination. PRINCE STREET SCHOOL.

THE midsummer examination of the City Schools began to-day in Prince Street School. The absence of Professor Anderson, Professor Caven, and other gentlemen who have, in the years that are past, examined the higher classes was felt; but the Ven. Archdeacon Read, the Rev. J. M. McLeod, Hon. John Longworth, Mr. T. A. Lepage and Mr. Oxenham put the pupils through a number of exercises. In the principal's department, the young ladies showed a high degree of proficiency in Latin, (Caesar) Geometry, (books I, II, and III) Arithmetic and English History. In all the other departments a decided advancement was visible. The pupils drawn from all classes in the community and ranging from the infant of four or five numbers to the young lady of sweet sixteen, looked very well indeed, and by their conduct gave evidence of careful training. The winner of the prize medal presented by the Governor General was Miss Sarah Ashley, who richly deserves the special credit she has obtained. The following is the Prize List.

Though comparatively few persons were present at the examination proper, quite a large audience assembled in the Upper Hall to hear the entertainment, and see the prizes given away. It was a most pleasing sight to see some five hundred healthful, happy children, arranged along the benches elevated for the occasion, and to hear the young voices in the rendition of the various selections—a sight to reassure even the most Jeremiaical. The programme, was, as a whole, very well rendered.

Hon. John Longworth explained that the School Board found themselves unable to give prizes other than cards of merit, and drew some consolation from the fact that the Governor-General had given a medal for the best scholar in each of the schools. He complimented the Principal and the teachers on the high degree of efficiency apparent in the school.

The Principal said the year had been one of hard work on the part both of the teachers and the pupils; the moral tone of the school has been excellent, and the discipline good.

Supreme Court.

WEDNESDAY, June 27.

The Grand Jury presented a true bill against Albert Allan for larceny of ten dollars from the store of Mr. C. H. Schurman; also a true bill against Thomas Enman and John Brown for assaulting with intent to rob George Henderson on North River Road.

Previous to their discharge, the Grand Jury made the following presentment:— GRAND JURY ROOM, QUEEN'S COUNTY, June 27, 1883.

The Grand Jury, this morning, thoroughly inspected Falconwood Asylum. They beg leave to report that they found the wards and other departments of the institution, remarkably neat and clean. The patients appear to be most comfortable, and are generally in a healthy condition.

While the wards of the Asylum are large and commodious, the Grand Jury find that there is not sufficient sleeping accommodation for the patients. The dormitories are overcrowded, and therefore detrimental to the health of the patients.

Crops in the Upper Provinces.

A Montreal despatch of Saturday gives the following summary of the news relative to the crops received that day from seventy-five counties:—"The hay yield is excellent being much better than for several years. Grain is on the whole below the average, and will be very poor. In many places much less than the usual acreage has been sown of wheat and oats. Their places have been taken up with barley or buckwheat. On very low ground everything has been killed, but on the dry or upland ground the crops are excellent. Oats seem to have suffered most wheat coming off far better. Peas and barley are not much cultivated, though in somewhat larger quantity than usual this year. Only about half a dozen places report corn as looking well. In low parts seed potatoes have rotted, but in other places they are growing luxuriously, and there will be a good crop if the bugs, which have assembled in myriads, do not destroy them. Apples are above the average.
