BOSTON, (AP)—Boston's battered Bruins—losers of three straight National Hockey League playoff games to Montreal's Canadiens—will be out to avoid elimination tonight in the fourth game of the series in Boston Garden.

The Canadiens have all but clinched the best-of-seven series with 2-0, 8-1 and 4-3 verdicts, the latter on Dickie Moore's goal with 90 seconds left Sunday night.

Bruins coach Lynn Patrick may shuffle his forward lines in an effort to get more scoring punch, but declined to say for sure pending today's squad meeting.

Big winger Ed Sandford—who suffered a slight shoulder separation when he crashed into the boards Sunday night while jousting with Kenny Modell—wasn't as seriously injured as first believed and will dress for tonight's clash.

Line Stars Intact

Fleming Mackell, hustling Bruin forward who suffered a twisted knee when checked heavily by defenceman Doug Harvey Sunday, also will be able to play.

The only certainty regarding his forward lines, Patrick said, is that the trio of Cal Gardner, rookie Doug Mohr and veteran Joe Kluckay will remain intact. Mohr and Gardner each got a goal Sunday night.

Montreal coach Dick Irvin plans to add left wing Calum Baldy Mackay and defenceman Jim Bud MacPherson to his line-up tonight.

The guessing in the Canadiens' camp is that left wing Ed Mazur and centre Paul Marmick will sit out the game.

# Matane Gains Easy Victory Over Fredericton

FREDERICTON, (CP)—The Red Rooks from Matane, Que., easily gained a second straight win in their eastern Canada Allan Cup semi-final bracket Monday night, trimming Fredericton Capitals 8-3 and taking a 2-0 lead in the best-of-seven series.

Jackson weighed 191 1-2 and Bucceroni, 192. The 22-year-old New York Negro, a 2-to-1 underdog, wore down the hard-punching, 26-year-old Bucceroni with a non-stop attack that had Dan reeling and bleeding with his right eye almost completely shut.

# U. S. Football Coaches Believed On Way Out

TORONTO, (CP)—Arthur Unacke Chipman of Winnipeg, who has been on the administrative end of football for more than 20 years, believes American coaches and players have given the game tremendous impetus but they are on their way out.

Chipman believes that in 10 years the country's professional teams will be made up of Canadian players and coached by Canadians. The players will come from the increased development of juniors, particularly in western Canada, and the coaches from the senior player ranks.

Chipman, a nattily-dressed, smiling-eyed Westerner, gave his views in an interview as he closed out his active football career during the week-end. He hasn't severed all connections with the game he loves—he's still on the Grey Cup dinner committee, the just-announced annual charity game committee and on the board of governors of the Canadian Rugby Union—but he no longer is in a position to take a big part in the affairs of the sport.

He has watched football grow from the days when Grey Cup finalists had to swear they were amateurs to the present era of high finance and prestige that if a recession hits the country the first to be affected will be football. "We have reached the peak on ticket prices and on team budgets and a leveling off is indicated."

"The men who run football in the West are business men and they know all this. They say costs should be cut but the high standard of play continued."

Chipman has had a close association with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers since 1933. He was president of the club from 1943 to 1947. President of the Western Interprovincial Football Union in 1948 and Canadian Rugby Union president two years ago.

Chipman, who figures he has made hundreds of friends through his football connections, credits football with being the "biggest single thing in promoting better relations between East and West."

# Praise For Ball Player In Legislature

Major MacDonald, who is chairman of the P.E.I. Baseball Committee, stated that Lewis had earned a contract with the Dodgers as the result of years of hard work and was certainly deserving of congratulations.

Lewis left here yesterday morning for the Brooklyn Dodgers training camp at Vero Beach, Florida.

TORONTO, (CP)—The tactics that paid off for Toronto Maple Leafs in the second game of their Stanley Cup semi-final against Detroit Red Wings will probably be coach King Clancy's answer to what the Leafs should do to even up the series before the teams head back to Detroit.

The Leafs' home ice will be the scene of the fourth game tonight before the battle shifts to Detroit again. The Leafs, down 2-1 in the best-of-seven engagement, realize that to stand more than an even chance to take the series they must be all square before returning to the Red Wings' lair.

The Leafs tonight will try to control the play from the opening face-off as they did in the second game, never giving the Red Wings power-laden forward lines the opportunity to get driving. That way they won the second tilt 3-1 after losing the opening encounter 5-0 to break even in the first two games on Detroit ice.

They didn't look too bad in losing 3-1 Saturday night at Toronto but they were unable to throw the Red Wings off balance to the extent they did in winning the second game.

# Wings Happy

The Red Wings' were in a happy frame of mind Monday night in Hamilton where they are staying between games in Toronto.

"When these guys rest, they rest," said coach Tommy Ivan.

Gordie Howe, the National Hockey League's leading scorer during the regular season and with Marty Pavelich the top point-getter for the Wings in the playoffs, came out of Saturday's game with a three-stitch injury over his left eye.

Bob Bailey, a rugged center and alone with forward Bob Hannigan the only Leafs who have more than a single point in the series, spent Sunday night in hospital after suffering a charley horse in Saturday's game. It was first thought he might not be ready for action tonight, but he was released Monday from hospital and the latest word is that he will be back in the Leaf's line-up.
