Mr. GOOLBY, lately private secretary to Mr. Gladstone, has been appointed Under-Secretary for India.

WILLIAM R. BAGGS, bar-keeper for R. B. Keith, Moncton, was found dead in his bed on Saturday morning.

The Quebec Government has withdrawn its action against the Montreal Telegraph Company for the provincial business tax.

The Governor-General has appointed Hugh McLennan, Geo. Hague and W. C. McDonald, Esq., governors of McGill University.

The Schooner "Ocean Bride," of St. John, sank in the Bay of Fundy on the 7th. William Collins, seaman, of Black Rock, N. B., was drowned.

LOCAL BUYERS have made a further reduction in the prices of eggs to 13 cents per dozen. Boston markets reported glutted and Island Eggs hard to sell at 17 cents.

The time for the trial of the following Dominion election cases has been extended for six months:—Kent, Kingston, West Haron, Lennox, West Northumberland and East Hastings.

ACCIDENT ON ISLAND RAILWAY.—Angus Gillis, Brakesman on the Eastern Train, was accidentally injured this morning at Georgetown. So far there are no full particulars as to cause of accident.

The Moncton Transcript has commenced a Potato Bug agitation. It points out the necessity of taking prompt measures to stamp out this nuisance, should it again make its appearance in New Brunswick.

BASEBALL.—In the recent matches between Boston and Detroit Clubs, Boston won by eleven runs; between Providence and Chicago, former won by eight runs; Buffalo and New York, Buffalo won by 7; and between Cleveland and Philadelphia, the latter scored only more than their opponents.

NEGLIGENCE.—We would call the attention of the Board of Health to the pile of manure recently placed on a lot close to Euston Street, the stench from which, to say the least, is offensive, and as we have now the hot weather upon us, the authorities should see to having it removed at once.

One of the most beautiful flower gardens on the line of Railway is that belonging to Mr. Alexander Clarke, Station Master at Kensington. The garden is in the immediate vicinity of the Station and presents a very fine appearance indeed. Mr. Clarke has also planted numerous ornamental trees which add much to the general effect. We would like to see other of the Station Masters imitate Mr. Clarke in this respect.

PEDESTRIANISM.—J. M. Cowie, of the London Athletic Club, the fastest sprinter in England, on Saturday, May 19th, was beaten by six inches in 150 yards in 14 4/5 seconds. He ran from scratch, the winner being handicapped several yards. There is no previous time, either amateur or professional, equal to this, but still, as Cowie did not win, he gets no record. The best time nominally remains 15 seconds, made by Charles Westhall nearly 21 years ago.

MORE VANDALISM.—Nearly every day we hear complaints in regard to those "night hawks" who go from place to place and steal flower-plants from those who take trouble and pleasure in caring for them. Not long since Mrs. Benjamin DesBrisay had an English Ivy carried away from the front of her residence, and several others of our citizens have complained of similar acts of vandalism, and last night another raid was made on a flower-plot on which these midnight prowlers have more than once left their tracks.

CRICKET.—G. E. Palmer, the famous Australian bowler, who, with Boyle, performed with such effect on inter-colonial teams to which they were opposed during the course of the last season at the Antipodes, has been coming out recently, and with success, as a sensational run-getter. During the last two years the colonial papers have been full of his great improvement as a batsman. In a match for the south Melbourne Club against Williamstown on April 7, he was credited with a big score of 204. Four times he hit the ball clear over the boundary.

AQUATIC.—The Canadian Association of amateur oarsmen will be held at Ottawa, July next. The new four-oared boats building for the Toronto by Warr will be launched on Monday or Tuesday complete. At the close of an eight-oared race on Wednesday between the Yale Juniors and Freshmen, the stroke of the winning Freshman eight fainted at the finish. Point of Pins matters have been finally settled. Hanlan and Kennedy received \$3,000 each from the Chelsea Beach Railway Company.

SUDDEN DEATH.—A painfully sudden death occurred on Queen Street this forenoon. Mr. Daniel Butler, in the employ of Mr. T. J. Farquharson, fell dead, while at work, removing merchandise from the sidewalk to Mr. Farquharson's store. The deceased was a man apparently thirty years of age, and was for some time past in delicate health. A post mortem examination will be held by Dr. Conroy, this afternoon, and an inquest will be held by Dr. McLeod, this evening, in the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court Room. THE TURF.—It is now announced that the directors of the Chicago Driving Park have arranged for a special event of the summer meeting for a match race between St. Julien and Clingstone for \$1,000 a side and \$5,000 added to the park association with \$1,000 extra if 2:10 is beaten. Mile heats, best 3 in 5 in harness, and under National Association rules. A forfeit of \$1,000 a side was posted and the match will be trotted on July 19th. The race for the Hardwick Stakes was won by Tristram, Lorillard's Troquois second, Shrewsbury third. There were nine starters. The race for the Windsor Castle Stakes was won by Eastern Emperor, Chamelle second, Brest third. Seven ran, including Lorillard's Pontiac.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Trouble in Zululand. CAPE TOWN, June 13. The troubles in Zululand are daily becoming more serious. Oham's people, who were formerly very friendly to Cetewayo, but who lately gave so much trouble to the King, have rebelled against Oham and have killed his son.

France and China. PARIS, June 13. Reports from China state that negotiations between that country and France are progressing favorably.

Indians Captured. TEXAS, June 13. General Crook, who crossed the Mexican Frontier a few months ago, in search of Indians, has returned after capturing three hundred.

German Politics. BERLIN, June 13. Count Von Benningson, leader of the National Liberals has resigned. His resignation threatens to break up that party in the Reichstag. The Reichstag yesterday passed the Budget.

Telegraph Notes. In the race at Harwich, on the 11th, the new cutter "Marjorie" won the Queen's cup. Mr. Davitt has rejoined the National League Committee at the request of Parnell.

An infernal machine, to which a fuse was attached, was sent by post to the Rathkeale, County Limerick, police barrack, a few days ago.

The Careys are detained in Dublin because, owing to fresh information, the Government is renewing its endeavors to obtain the surrender of Walsh and Tynan.

Four young ladies and a young man were drowned in Provo Lake, near Benjamin, Utah, on Sunday evening by the accidental capsizing of a boat while out with a pleasure party.

In the case of the dynamite conspirators' trial, in London, on the 11th, after hearing the testimony to prove that Whitehead had purchased acids, glycerine and other compounds used in the manufacture of explosives, the court adjourned.

Eronaut, L. Host, who made an unsuccessful attempt, last Thursday, to cross the British channel in a balloon from Boulogne renewed the attempt early on Saturday morning. He has not since been heard from, and it is feared he was carried out over the North Sea, fell, and was drowned.

There is little doubt but that the preliminary basis of peace between Bolivia and Peru has been signed with Iglesias. El Comercio, of the 11th, says the basis of peace has been signed by one of the most honorable chiefs of the Peruvian army, and that there are hopes of an early adjustment of political relations with Bolivia.

Minister Hunt and Admiral Baldwin received gold medals commemorative of the coronation of the Czar. Admiral Baldwin has received a gold snuff box, with a portrait of the Czar, set in brilliants, to mark the Czar's personal appreciation of the courtesy of the United States in sending a special naval mission to Moscow.

The Lower House of Landtag, on the 11th, debated the church bill. Herr Von Gossler, Minister of Public Instruction and Ecclesiastical Affairs, denied that the measure was mostly intended to provide for the care of souls in cases of necessity. The bill was an earnest endeavor on the part of the German Government to ascertain whether it was possible to maintain peace between Church and State.

The text of the reprint of the five acts of the present pontificate relative to Ireland shows that the letter of the eleventh of May merely formulated the unchanging policy of the Vatican throughout the present pontificate, and that the Pope wrote to Cardinal McCabe August 1st, 1882, informing him, he (the Pope) was confident that British statesmen would give satisfaction to the Irish people when they demanded what was just.

The celebration to commemorate the services of the Right Hon. John Bright, as representative to Parliament for Birmingham for over a quarter of a century, began here on the 11th. A procession of delegates, from various Liberal societies, a mile and a half in length, passed in review before Mr. Bright and saluted him. One of the chief features of the day's celebration was the presentation of a gold medal to Mr. Bright. The demonstration at the railway station where Mr. Bright arrived, and throughout the line of march resembled a royal progress. The route of the procession, which was five miles long, was densely crowded with people.

The wrestling tournament closed at St. Louis, on the 11th. Whistler took the first prize for Greco-Roman, and second prize for catch-as-catch-can. Bibby took the first prize for catch-as-catch-can. The first contest on the 11th was between Whistler and Christol; it was a fierce struggle for five minutes, when Whistler threw the Frenchman on the left shoulder, dislocating it. The second bout, between Cannon and Bibby, catch-as-catch-can, was won by Bibby in twelve minutes. The third, between Cannon and Whistler, Greco-Roman, was won by Whistler in thirty minutes. The fourth, between Bibby and Whistler, was won by the former in three minutes. Cannon received second prize for Greco-Roman.
