THURSDAY, Dec. 11.—The law closes up grouse shooting to-day. The game laws are a remnant of the forest laws imposed by William the Conqueror, who, to preserve his game, made it forfeiture of property to disable a wild beast; with loss of eyes if it were a stag, buck or boar. The clergy protested against ameliorating these laws under Henry III. In 1877 Great Britain received for licenses to kill game \$931,760, a little short of a million of dollars, having convicted in one year (viz. 1869) over ten thousand persons for amusing themselves with a gun without permission.

A Financial Difficulty.

VIENNA, Dec. 10.
The Bohemian Mortgage Company is in great difficulty owing to a crisis in the sugar trade. The Minister of Finance has asked the banks, both national and others, to unite in an effort to prevent its collapse. Its collapse would involve the downfall of forty Savings Banks, and bring ruin to a host of poor depositors.

Lottery Swindler Arrested.

The Dry Dock in St. John's.

ST. JOHN'S Nfld., Dec. 10.
The ceremony of opening the great Simpson Dry Dock at St. John's, was performed to-day. The British corvette Tenedos was successfully docked. The dock will accommodate the largest steamship. The cost was \$600,000.

Limitation of Alcohol.

BERLIN, Dec. 10.
The Congo committee has agreed to the insertion of a clause in the protocol, expressing the wish of the powers, to limit the importation of alcohol as much as possible.

LONDON, Dec. 10.
It is reported that Waddington is going to Paris to report the result of his interviews with Earl Granville and Marquis Tseng. It is believed that negotiations are definitely stopped.

LONDON, Dec. 10.
Henry Hartley, junior member for Parliament for Wolverhampton, will succeed John Tomlinson Hilbert as Undersecretary of the Home Department.

A Prince Promoted.

LONDON, Dec. 10.
Truth says the Duke of Edinburgh has been appointed to the command of the Mediterranean squadron.

Advices have been received of the drowning of another Canadian voyageur in the Nile.
