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GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

St. John's, Nfld., May 19.—Small pox

is reported among the French trawler

on Red Island, on the French trawler

coast. The population of this

city was thrown into a state of panic

last night by a series of earthquakes

that did much damage here and other

places. The people ran terror-stricken

to the streets. Houses swayed like

ships at sea. In a number of cases

roofs fell in, injuring many persons.

The wildest scenes were

at the theatres, where the perfor-

mances were going on. Crowds made

wild rushes for the exits. No respect

was shown for women, weak or aged

in the rush, and many were badly

hurt.

YOKOHAMA, May 20.—Prince Komatsu,

commander-in-chief of the Japanese

army, has left Port Arthur and

returned to Japan. The Japanese

army will be sent to the island of

Formosa in order to quell the distur-

bances there, and occupy the territory

for Japan, according to the treaty

signed between China and Japan.

Two of the seven Japanese

divisions which have occupied Port

Arthur will remain in occupation of

that place while the present suspen-

sion of matters between Japan and

Russia continues.

The Japanese newspapers, in their

comments upon Japan's yielding to

the demands of the protesting

powers, state that the Russian

consul has announced that

torpedo boats have been sent to

the harbor of Vladivostok.

St. John's, Nfld., May 20.—Sir Herbert

Murray, British relief commissioner,

closed the relief work here on

Saturday. The warship Cleopatra

will sail to-morrow on a

seed potatoes and salt for the

fisheries for distribution

along the coast. There has been

a great falling off in the number

of men prosecuting the Labrador

fisheries, owing to the

impossibility of procuring

supplies. Much destitution is

expected in consequence.
