VISITING VESSELS

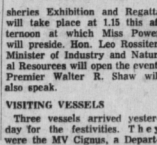
Three vessels arrived yesterday for the festivities. They were the MV Cigars, a Depart-

Inter-Union Seamen's War Ears Crisis on Long Lakes

OTTAWA, CP — International shoreward employment is shoring up the bloody battle between two unions for supremacy on the Great Lakes, reliable sources said Tuesday.

Organized labor was marshaled in its power behind the newly formed Canadian Maritime Union (CMU) amid indications of a split in the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA) against the maverick Seafarers International Union of Canada.

Crews on the St. Lawrence Canal and Welland Canal were reported to be ready to sign a package of the international waterway in support of the CMU and in protest against a blockade that has crippled daily against CMU members and their supporters.

The blockade, which would be in retaliation for a divisive boycott of CMU-managed ships by the Association, was said to be aimed only at ships used by SEU crews.

The federal government was urged of the possibility of such a boycott.

The department spokesman said Toronto lawyer Sam Hodge had been appointed an agent of the justice minister to help in the negotiations.

The Canadian Brotherhood of Railway, Transport and Allied Trades Unions (CBRTA) was reported to be in favour of the blockade.

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Slash Fire In Que. Increases In Size

ROBEURVAL, Que. (CP) — Forestry officials were discouraged Tuesday as a giant slash fire, which started last Friday night, was increased by the rain all around the area for two weeks, but none on the fire.

"It's a very tough fire," said Henri Proul, spokesman for the St. Maurice Forest Protective Association. "There's been rain all around the area for two weeks, but none on the fire."

The Quebec government has announced that most forested regions in Roberval county have been closed to all forestry workers to cut down the fire hazard.

Some 3,000 cords, or \$50,000 worth, of freshly-cut wood was burned during the weekend. A few fishing camps also have been lost, as well as some fire-fighting equipment.

Two government-owned Cano tanks and two smaller tanker aircraft pumped the hot spots with water, but heavy winds have made it difficult to contain the fire.

KAMLOOPS, B.C. (CP) — The Menasha polling station in the remote Chiloquin country of British Columbia sent back an empty ballot box Tuesday from the June 18 federal election.

The deputy returning officer had this note inside: "I haven't filled in the papers. Anyway, there was no voter."

Menasha, an Indian reserve, had 22 eligible voters. With the return of the box, Kamloops constituency counting was complete.

The final result gave Justice Minister Pauline Gagnier 768; Walter Inglis, N.D.P., 476; Jari White, Liberal, 401; and Clarence Wright, Social Credit, 241.

Returning officer Mrs. Helen Millard said there was a "big stampede" on the area just prior to the election and "it's possible all 22 arrived home too late."
