It must be remembered, he said, that both Ontario and Quebec are stressing heavier plantings of tablestock potatoes which is bound to cut in on tablestock sales for this province.

Trip To Far East, India Described

A series of colored slides accompanied by a running narrative by Rev. David MacDonald gave Rotarians at their weekly luncheon meeting in the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday a close-up view of life in Southeast Asia and India where he recently spent several months.

In his tour which ranged from Australia to Thailand and Hong Kong, Mr. MacDonald made his first stop-over at Fiji Islands which he said was about the size of P.E.I. The rainfall in that area is usually 130 inches annually. The population consists largely of two racial and cultural groups.

Visiting Korea, Mr. MacDonald was struck by the devastated state of the country. Poverty is prevalent, but the people, particularly in the country districts, are extremely resourceful. The largest girls' university in the world, with accommodation for 8,000 students is in marked contrast to the old set-up.

"Sitting in on an 18 course dinner was an unusual experience for me but quite commonplace among some of the families visited", Mr. MacDonald said. At the presidential mansion in South Korea, the visitors met the "first lady" who is a Buddhist. In Viet-Nam, Mr. MacDonald was told that there were 300,000 orphan refugee children added to the national population.

Visiting Bangkok, Thailand was a vastly different experience, Mr. MacDonald said. With 50 per cent of the streets being canals, boats are the means of transport. Shopping, bathing, washing clothes in a temperature of 90 degrees appears to be routine. Buddhism is extremely active here and the magnificent temples everywhere are lavishly decorated with gold leaf. In Rangoon and Calcutta the mystery and contentment of people is noticeable in view of the 430,000,000 inhabitants of India, which country has contributed greatly to the architectural and cultural world. Mr. MacDonald was introduced by chairman, John Evans

and thanked by co-chairman, Ralph Manning. Mr. MacDonald was educated at West Kent School, Prince of Wales College, Dalhousie University and Pine Hill Divinity Hall. He was ordained in June 1961. From 1956-60 he was president of the National Young People's Union of the Charlottetown Church of Canada. Selected to attend the third Assembly of World Council of Churches in New Delhi in the fall of 1961, he with four others represented the Protestant, Anglo-Catholic and Orthodox youth. At present he is waiting settlement by the Maritime Conference. President John Simmonds announced that the club's representative, Miss Judy Archer leaves for Ottawa next Sunday

to attend the Rotary Adventure in Citizenship meeting at Ottawa. W. J. Hancock reporting for the Easter Seal campaign said that slightly more than \$9,000 had been contributed. The final report will be submitted early in June. Darrell MacGuire, a former member of the Charlottetown Rotary Club now residing in Amherst was presented with a bannerette. A banner presented by the Rotary Club of Poughkeepsie, N.Y. to Andrew Likely during a recent visit, was added to the local collection. SOURIS — Morell Regional High School last night captured the Kings County debating title and the Souris Junior Board of Trade trophy. The trophy will be presented to the winners at the graduation exercises in mid-June by Camille Gallant of the sponsoring board of trade.

To win the title the two Morell teams of Rodney Dingwell, Edna Tobin and Gemma Dunn, Barry Creamer, gained two split decisions, one at Morell over Souris Regional High, and the other at Montague over Montague Regional High.

In the contest between the second teams from Montague and Souris, the former gained an unanimous decision over Souris, to give them second place. At Morell the subject for debate was "Resolved that Canada's defence forces should be equipped with nuclear weapons." At Souris "Resolved that Canada should provide a complete medical care plan for all its citizens." At Montague "Resolved that Canada should go to war rather than accept Communism."

Police Chase Ends In Crash

A high speed chase which started on the north end of Great George Street, and continued north on Elm Avenue, west on Bayfield and south on Upper Queen, ended up with two vehicles sustaining heavy damage at the intersection of Euston and Upper Queen streets, and the driver of one vehicle in custody.

The chase ended when a 1959 Consul, driven by Leo McKenna, Newton Cross, and pursued by the city police, failed to stop for the red light at the corner of Queen and Euston and plowed into the left rear corner of a 1954 or '55 Buick sedan.

The impact resulted in the Buick, operated by John L. MacKinnon, East Royalty, and travelling east on Euston, being turned completely around and facing west.

The Consul suffered heavy damage to the front end and had to be towed from the scene, while the Buick was heavily damaged in the rear and left rear. Despite its damage the bigger car was able to proceed under its own power. Neither of the drivers suffered any injury.

She was also a member of the Holy Name and St. Pius X bowling teams.

In addition to her husband, she is survived by two sons, Lorne, 17, Harry 13, one daughter, Leah, 8, a sister, Mona in Charlottetown and her parents in Montreal. A brother Danny predeceased her.

The remains will rest at the Hennessey Funeral Home this evening. Funeral arrangements have not yet been announced.
