## Student Union CONSTITUTION OVERHAULED

The UPEI Student Union Constitution will finally receive a badly needed overhaul this semester. A committee of the Student Council led by chairman Maurice Rogerson will review the Constitution, propose certain amendments before a general meeting of the Union, and hopefully frame a new and more efficient document.

The Student Council has been trying to formulate a new set of laws for several years. This year's Council has repeatedly found itself held up, mystified, or completely frustrated by the present Constitution which is out of date and poorly framed.

Hartwell Daley, a well-known journalist and an instructor at Holland College put on a special Journalism seminar recently for the UPEI SUN staff. Daley, an expert in his journalism field, relayed some very important information on sources of news stories; how to interview people, how to set our Robertson

Library to good use, and ways to improve our news coverage at the university.

One of Daley's excellent suggestions was that the best source of information is from a disgruntled person who will gladly tell you all you want to know. Daley also pointed out that the amount of time spent on Thinking is nearly

NIL. in the world and expressed the need for people to use their minds at all times. Mr. Daley will be back again for another

seminar on Journalism and everyone will be cordially invited to attend with a very interesting journalist known across the country.

Certain provisions in the Constitution are in direct conflict with each other, the powers and duties of officers are poorly defined, and some provisions directly violate the basic principles of representative student government.

The new committee will spend approximately 3-4 weeks reviewing and formulating proposed amendments. In late November

or early December, a general meeting will be called at which time the proposed amendment will be rehearsed, discussed, and voted on.

The committee has decided to hold closed meetings simply because they wish to present the proposal to Council before releasing them to the general student body.

Copies of the present constitution are available

in the Student Union office. Comments or suggestions for proposal amendments are most welcome, and the committee is hoping to have as much input as possible from students. If you have any suggestions, see Kevin Gauthier in the union office. Other committee members are Gordie Coffin, Derek Key, Gail Murphy, and Larry Currie.
