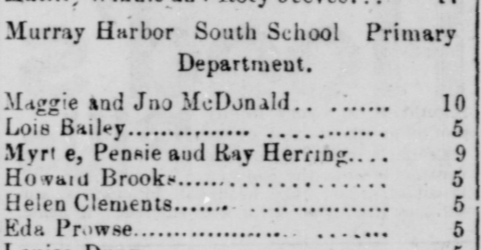
Commencement EXERCISES At Notre Dame Convent Ch'town, on Wednesday, June 22nd, 1898
