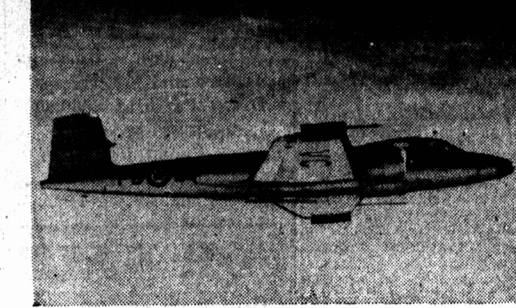
SPRING BROOK W. I.

DEADLY SHOWERS

A shower of deadly rockets spews from the RCAF's latest model of the OP-100 jet fighter. It is the first rocket-armed aircraft in the British Commonwealth and the first fighter aircraft to be equipped with internally-stowed rockets. Defence Production Minister Howe said in the Commons the rocket-firing, radar-equipped Mark IV model is the fourth Avro-Canada OP-100 type to be developed. He said it will go into volume production this summer after an expenditure of roughly \$100,000,000 in development costs.
