Salt Mine Seen Boost For Economy

The available reserve of rock salt in being increased by 200 million tons this month as a new mine enters into production at Pugwash, Nova Scotia. The official opening of the Pugwash mine will be held at the site on Wednesday, Nov. 4. An imposing delegation of officials representing the governments of the five eastern provinces and the federal government is expected to attend. Officiating at the ceremony will be the federal minister of mines and technical surveys, Paul Comtois. Developed by the Malagash Salt Company, oldest rock salt mining firm in Canada, the Pugwash mine lies under a porous, water-bearing formation which delayed the sinking of the shaft by several years. Over 300,000 bags of cement were required to build a colossal, water-proof wall around the shaft from the surface to the 358-foot level where the solid salt was begun. In June 1955, the shaft inched its way through unstable ground until March of this year. Once the solid formation was encountered, it took only a few months to reach the chosen mining depth of 630 feet.

CONTRACT BRIDGE BY B. JAY BECKER

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been: West North East South 1♥ 1♠ 2♥ ? What would you now bid with each of the following four hands? 1. ♠Q762 ♥8 ♦KQJ53 ♣KJ4 2. ♠10 ♥J74 ♦983 ♣AQ8752 3. ♠QJ ♥953 ♦KJ73 ♣KQ82 4. ♠KJ943 ♥8 ♦AJ762 ♣K5 1. Three spades. In general, an overall in the one level denotes a hand that has less than the values required for an opening bid. It is a competitive bid made primarily for the purpose of contesting a part score. Game is not the intended goal. The informatory double is the weapon used over an opening bid when there is interest in reaching game. North's spade bid must be dealt with in the light of these principles. He will ordinarily have a reasonably good suit, but his high card strength can range from 7 to 13 points. The jump raise to three spades is made to encourage him to go to four if he has a high-grade overall, but permits him to pass with lesser values. No useful purpose is served by naming the diamond suit. 2. Pass. It is clear the opponents have the better hand and cannot be successfully outbid. To venture into three clubs would present them with the opportunity to exact a penalty, if they are so inclined, or go on to the game which they are likely to have. The spade overall warns us of the danger of a misfit. Silence is the safest course to follow. 3. Two spades. It is unusual to raise partner with only two trumps, but no better bid is available. The Q-J are good enough support for partner's suit when he overcalls, particularly because an overall is based more on the soundness of the suit bid than on high card points. There is a good chance that North has a six-card spade suit. It would be wrong to venture into the dark by bidding three clubs or diamonds. Spades are already marked as playable. 4. Four spades. There is not much point to bidding only three spades for the purpose of inviting partner to bid four. It is quite likely that at least ten tricks can be made with spades as trump, and North should not be given the opportunity to pass under game when game figures to be made even if he has a minimum overall. To bid less than four would be to acknowledge a lack of faith in partner's overall. North must have had some reason for bidding a spade and, whatever his values are, he should be enthusiastically supported.

Union Chiefs Probe Strikes

LONDON (Reuters) - Worried British union leaders Wednesday decided to investigate a growing rash of unofficial strikes that are hitting shipping, the automotive industry and railways. The general council of the 8,250,000-member Trades Union Congress ordered an inquiry to begin Nov. 16. Meanwhile, fresh wildcat walkouts were reported at a carburetor plant and a Liverpool dock. The 22,000-ton Cunard liner Sylvania, scheduled to sail for Montreal Wednesday afternoon, was stalled at Liverpool—with about 200 passengers aboard—by an unofficial strike of River Mersey tugboatmen. She was one of 58 ships held up. Some 4,000 dockworkers have been made idle by the strike which the tugmen decided Wednesday to continue. The dispute began Friday when a skipper was reprimanded for smoking while piloting an oil tanker. It has spread to all 600 tugboatmen and 60 tugs. More trouble hit the Liverpool docks when 300 workmen walked off the 26,000-ton Orient liner Oronsay because fellow employees were docked half a day's pay for coming to work late. The ship is due to leave Liverpool Nov. 21 after a £1,959,000 refitting job. At Birmingham, 200 workers making carburetors for British Motor Corporation cars walked out in support of a pay boost bid. About 300 others there were laid off.

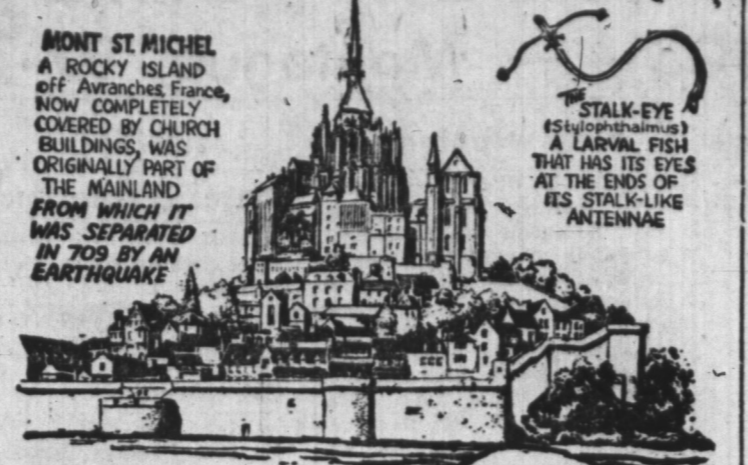
RECORD PACT

OTTAWA (CP) - Sales of the new Canada savings bonds have hit a record pace in the first nine days of the sales campaign, the finance department said. Preliminary reports based on incomplete tabulations show sales of \$166,000,000 in the nine business days between Oct. 13 and last Friday. This compares with \$144,000,000 in the corresponding period of the 1958 savings bond campaign.
