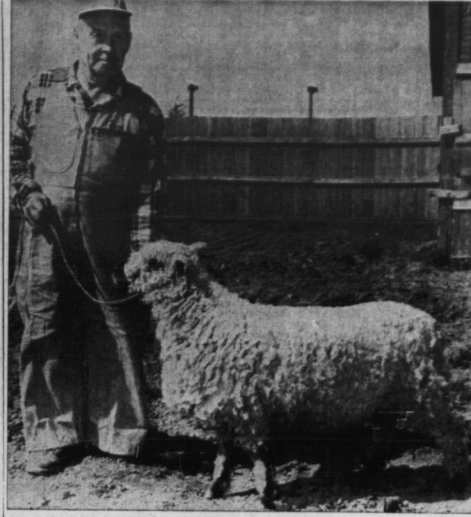

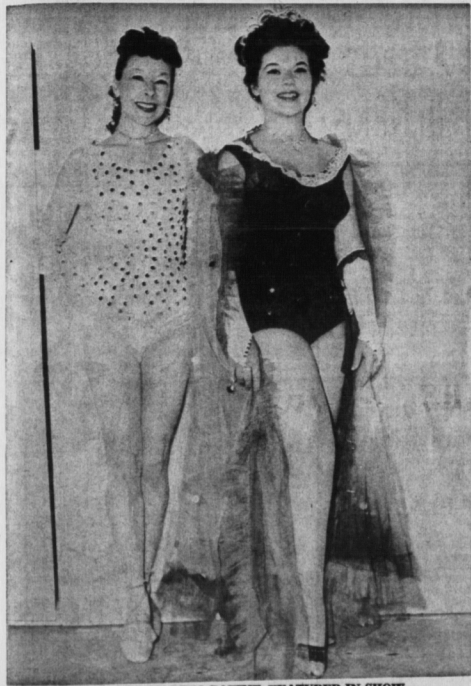
SUSAN SCHURMAN DOLL CARRIAGE WINNER

Cattle judging, a baby contest, horse racing, a big bingo, preliminary judging of Miss Prince Edward Island contestants, feature acts on stage at the stadium, together with all the fascinating sights and sounds at the carnival will be provided the interest throughout the day and evening.

Also on the program today is the opportunity for the public to go aboard HMS "Astute", the submarine tied on the west side of the Summerside marina which is open to the public from 4 to 6 p.m.

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — For the first time in the seven-year history of the Summerside Lobster Carnival, a sheep and horse show yesterday was one of the main parts of the day's activities.

The livestock exhibition in previous years has included sheep or horses. Enthusiasm was high among competitors and spectators as the sleek animals paraded before Judge, Almon Bowtell and George Kilson. Mr. Bowtell judged the sheep while Mr. Kilson judged the horses. About 40 sheep, 17 horses and six ponies made up the various classes.

One of the features of the Livestock Exhibition, Keith Barrett, and secretary, Graeme Linkletter are most anxious to see the sheep and horse show draw a larger number of spectators than last year's cattle exhibition.

The Lobster Carnival-Livestock Exhibition will receive a trophy for the best sheep of the show was captured by W. A. Moase and Son, Kensington. The Moase flock also won grand champion and reserve grand in the "chubby" class.

Is Popular
