Schurman Firm Awarded Contract For New Federal Building At Shediac, N. B.

The Department of Public Works, Ottawa, announced yesterday that a contract for construction of a new federal building in Shediac, N.B., has been awarded to the M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. with headquarters in Summerside.

The new construction will be built on the site of the present post office building, which will be moved to one side so that the postal service may carry on as usual until the new structure is completed. The design will be similar to that of the three public buildings erected on Prince Edward Island in the past couple of years (Summerside, Kensington, Montague) being 3-story in size plus full basement of steel frame construction with brick and tile walls and sandstone trim. It will house the Department of Fisheries and Unemployment Insurance with the main floor being used by the Postal Department.

OTTAWA, (CP)—Contracts totaling \$3,506,567 were awarded by the public works department during July, it was announced Wednesday.

Callow Coach To Visit Alberton For First Time

A Walter Callow wheelchair coach will be in Alberton and vicinity on Friday of this week. During recent years many residents of this area have contributed to the fund through which these coaches are made available when a Walter Callow tag day has been sponsored by members of Regalette Rebekah Lodge.

The idea of building coaches which could accommodate wheelchair chairs and thus make it possible for invalids to enjoy occasional rides was conceived by Walter Callow, a veteran of World War I, himself blind, paralyzed and unable to move or help himself in any way.

The great spirit of this man rises above his physical infirmity to an almost unbelievable degree and for years his active brain has been devising ways and means to help his fellowmen.

In May, 1947, the first wheelchair coach in the world was completed; since then others have been built. They have visited many centres in the Maritimes and brought happiness to many people who would otherwise have little or no opportunity to enjoy the outdoors. For the first time a coach is scheduled to visit Alberton. The news was first conveyed to Mrs. Clayton Travers, treasurer of the local Rebekah Lodge, through a long distance telephone call during which she had the thrilling experience of speaking to Mr. Callow.

The coach will arrive in Alberton Thursday evening and on Friday at least twelve persons will be taken for a drive. The route to be taken and other final plans will be decided by members of the Rebekah Lodge in consultation with Miss Annabelle McEachern, coach hostess. The driver of the coach is Mr. Jonah.

Canada Wins

Possibly the biggest upset on the program was the victory of the youthful eight crew at Vedder, 48 miles east of Vancouver. The Englishmen, representing the Thames rowing club from London, were made heavy favorites in practice workouts the last 10 days but the Canadian students weren't a bit impressed.

FIRST WIN They set the pace from the 250-metre mark and stroked across the finish line of the 2,000-metre course 2 1/4 lengths in front. It marked Canada's first win in this event in the 24-year history of the games.

But things weren't so easy for other Canadian watermen at Vedder. Bobby Williams of Hamilton, was third, and last, in the single sculls, and the same placing was taken by the double sculls team of Don Guest and Larry Stephan, both of Toronto.

Williams and the doubles sculls pair were well beaten. Don Rowlands of New Zealand won the singles easily and the Australian twosome of 37-year-old Mervyn Wood and 28-year-old Murray Riley, both policemen in New South Wales, won the doubles as expected by experts.

Wood and Riley later teamed up with Geoff Williamson, Peter Ewart and Lionel Robberds, Cox, to take the fours championship. FOUR RECORDS GO Patrick's win came at the end of the swimming and diving program that saw the swimmers erase four records from the Games books. Patrick's victory wasn't too much of a surprise.

He had been showing excellent style in practice and proved he was of championship class when he was runner-up to Scotland's Peter Heath, defending champion, by a fraction of a point after Tuesday's first six dives. Patrick came out strong Wednesday on his last four to beat Australia's Kevin Newell while Healy faded to third.
