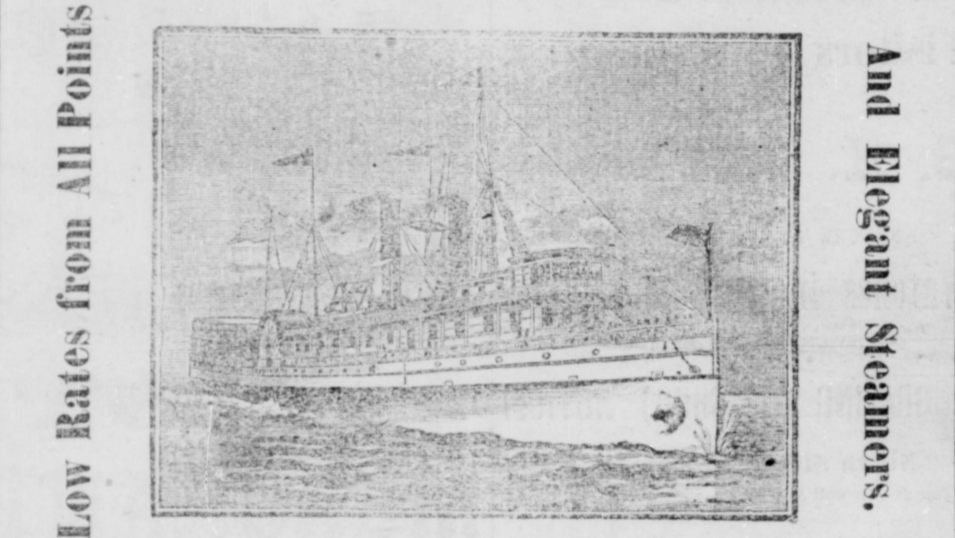

King's County Exhibition

A Large Number Present.

ADDRESS TO THE GOVERNOR.

On opening the Exhibition yesterday, His Honor, the Lieutenant-Governor, was presented with the following

ADDRESS:
To the Honorable Andrew A. Macdonald, Lieutenant-Governor of P. E. Island.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOR,—We, the Commissioners appointed to manage the Exhibition for King's County, 1888, are gratified to meet your Honor on this occasion; and from the interest heretofore taken by you in the progress of our farming and industrial pursuits, we entertain the hope that your Honor will be much pleased with the indications of advancement made since our last meeting.

We regret that, owing to the very late harvest, the exhibits of cereals will scarcely come up to the standards of former years; that is to say, as regards the number of samples exhibited, but the quality will be found equal to the best ever grown in this Island.

It will also be observed that the display of Fruits in the several sections is not so large as could be desired, for the reason that our exhibition is held at a time when those productions are not fully matured.

The exhibits in the department allotted to Roots and Vegetables will be found, on inspection, to compare favorably with those shown at any former exhibition in this county.

The show of Horses and Cattle, especially the former, will be viewed as most satisfactory, giving evidence of marked improvement in stock raising. This result, we venture to assert, has been attained by the careful and judicious expenditure of the annual grants provided by the legislature of the Province.

The Commissioners respectfully submit that in future it is most desirable that those grants should be increased to an amount commensurate to the resources of the Province.

The importance of encouraging and fostering agricultural enterprise, is, at the present time, more apparent than ever before in the history of this section of the Dominion.

When it is borne in mind that our fisheries have been destroyed, and our fishing grounds made waste by the depredations of those who are not of our country, it becomes an imperative duty that encouragement be given to our hardy fishermen to turn their labor in the direction of cultivating the soil, in order to obtain the means of subsistence of which they have been deprived.

On reviewing the returns from the labors of the husbandman and the artisan for the past year, we feel that the people of this Province have much cause for thankfulness.

The season now about to close has been a period of continued prosperity, and the harvest now being gathered is most abundant.

We now desire to tender our assurance of respect and regard for your Honor personally. In conclusion, we now request you to open this Exhibition to the public.

His Honor replied in one of his practical common-sense addresses, which it is at once a profit and a pleasure to hear. He spoke of the warm interest he felt in the prosperity of King's County,—the county of his birth, youth and manhood; of the advantages possessed by the farmers of this Province; of the folly of many of the young men who leave it to settle upon less fertile fields; and instanced particularly the evidence of a gentleman who had travelled the world over, and who was yet delighted by the prospects presented in the productive landscapes of Prince Edward Island.

His Honor and suite then inspected the exhibits, among which were a very creditable display of cloths by the Charlottetown Woollen Factory, not referred to in THE EXAMINER of yesterday.

It cannot with truth be said that the behaviour of the crowds in attendance was absolutely good. Very few, apparently, entered into a careful inspection of the exhibits, with a view to instruction and improvement. A large proportion seemed to be rather bent upon having "a good time"; and too many indulged intemperately in the use of intoxicating drinks and bad language. The behaviour of these latter persons was calculated to reflect discredit upon the exhibition and upon the majority in attendance—who were at least sober and quiet. It is to be regretted that a few special constables were not detailed to arrest the drunkards, fighters and blasphemers. Still more is to be regretted that in this age of schools, churches and Scott Act, there are young men to make such "exhibitions" of themselves.
