It is pleasing to learn that our farmers are being aroused to the necessity of taking greater care in the preparation of oats for market.

The Creamery.

One of the curiosities at the Toronto Exhibition is a "Creamery" in operation.

The butter department is situated at the southern end of the addition, and is now in full operation. One large churn, capable of turning out 150 pounds of butter at a single churning, is to be seen at work.

The cheese department, was invented by A. W. Brintnall, of Belleville, and the machinery and process may be described as follows: It consists of a frame extending the whole length of the vat and over the center, with a small line shaft running along on top of the frame with four small level pinion cog-wheels, which mesh into four larger level cog wheels that are fastened on the top of four small upright shafts two feet long, extending down through the two horizontal pieces in the frame.

SECOND DAY.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—The Wesleyan Ecumenical Conference resolved that there should be devotional exercises to show the sympathy of the Conference with the people of America, to-day, offering prayer for the restoration of the health of the President.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—The interest in the proceedings of the Conference seems to be on the increase day by day. The galleries are filled with spectators, including ministers of the other Nonconforming bodies and some few of the Established Church.
