Harness races will be held over the Halifax Exhibition track June 23rd. At present there are a large number of horses in training and most of them will take part. Work-out days are Tuesdays and Fridays and quite a number of people go out to see the speedsters perform. Among those being trained are Beaton Grant-2:10, Todd Brewer trial 2:14, Sutton-Worthy by Frank Patch 2:05 1-4, Golden Dream a two-year-old and Earl Gratton trial 2:10, all in the stable of Frank Adams.

Billy Cummins has under his wing Star G 2:09, owned by Harry Breen, Halifax, High Toby 2:11 1-4, Barnette 2:13 1-4, Easter Dawn, a green trotter, and a green pacer from Ontario, all owned by Hedley T. Fulton.

Guy Brown 2:03, eligible to the 2:12 pace and last year raced on the track is owned by George Turner, Dartmouth, and Calumet Duke 2:14, owned by neighbor George Kuhn in an adjoining stall.
