

Local and Other Items.

HONKIRK arrived from Ottawa last evening. New Lace just opened at J. B. Macdonald's. Six hundred State-aided emigrants left for America on Friday. The Car has issued an edict abolishing the transit of European goods across the Caucasus. The Barber brothers, the Iowa outlaw, were taken from gaol by a mob on Friday and hanged. It is stated on French authority that the Malagasy envoys have been instructed to wait for peace. The Car reviewed fifty-five thousand troops at Moscow on Saturday, and in the morning left for the Peterhof palace. It is thought probable that Earl Roseberry will return to office, at an early date, as Minister for Scotland, with Cabinet rank. In consequence of the occurrence of a break in the cable from Madras to Penang, all news from Tonquin will be delayed a week. Mr. R. HARRIS, R. C. A., arrived home last evening after an absence in Europe and the Upper Provinces of Canada, of nearly two years. Mr. W. E. BAGNALL, lately train despatcher on the P. E. Island Railway arrived from Ottawa yesterday on a two weeks visit to his friends. The death is announced by cable of Sir Arthur E. Kennedy, at one time governor of Vancouver's Island, and lately governor of Queensland. The Chinese firms at Victoria, British Columbia, are about to petition their Government to allow no more emigrants to go to that province. A SPECIAL session of Port la Joie Encampment will be held at Oddfellows Hall this evening at 8 o'clock for the purpose of conferring degrees. The Propaganda at Rome is preparing to print five acts of the present pontificate relative to Ireland, for circulation among the Irish bishops and clergy. The New York county woman's suffragists have adopted a resolution, thanking the Canadian and Italian Premiers for introducing female suffrage in their franchise bills. The store of Hon. Joseph O. Arsenault, at Wellington, has lately been enlarged to double its former capacity. This is consistent with the expanding business of the country. EVIDENCE has been given before a committee of the Chicago Board of Trade, showing that a firm in that city is engaged in manufacturing "prime steam lard" from animal refuse. FIVE HUNDRED cases of eggs were sent from Misouche Station during May. This is good for Misouche, and the Messrs. Desloche, who are the principal egg dealers of that thriving community. THE emigration movement still continues. The Allan steamer on Thursday brought over one thousand souls, besides several hundreds who sailed by the Dominion and Beaver lines. A large number are booked for Kanitoba. THE preliminary enquiry by the Archbishop and Bishop of the Province of Quebec for the canonization of the late Bishop Laval, and the first report covering one thousand pages of foolscap has been sent to Rome. ADVICES from Rome state that copies of the five acts of the pontificate of Leo XIII. relative to Ireland have been sent to all the bishops of Great Britain and her colonies, Ireland and the United States, and to the leading British statesmen. JAMES BARCLAY, Broker, sold by auction for the benefit of the owners, on Tuesday, the barkentine "Eliza Smead," wrecked off Egmont Bay last fall. The hull was knocked down to John A. Matheson for \$315—the sails, rigging, etc., brought \$570—the whole wreck being up \$885. MACKEREL LOOKING OUT FOR DANGER.—A Gloucester despatch of the 7th says: The transparency of the water this season is unprecedented and interferes seriously with the success of the mackerel fleet. The fish are the operations of the seine, and keep away. THE interment of the remains of John Howard Payne, author of "Home, Sweet Home," were interred in the Oakville cemetery at Washington on Saturday. President Arthur sent a number of representative men were present, and the proceedings throughout were of the character of a national tribute. PRINCE'S Fancy Portraits have now reached the number of 138. The last is a portrait of Lord Lansdowne, our coming Governor-General. He is dressed in snow-dust costume, "specially adapted to remaining for some time out in the cold." The English journalists have ideas about our climate even more extreme than the climate itself. The portrait, by the way, is that of a fine looking, vigorous man. THE heaviest train of the season was brought yesterday from Tignish in charge of Conductor McKee. It consisted of fifteen cars, nine of which were filled with herring for trans-shipment in the Boston steamer. The remaining cars were filled with miscellaneous freight and passengers. It is credited to Conductor McKee and Driver McLean that this heavy train was in "on time," and it shows that the railway is in excellent trim. AN ICE BOUND SEALING FLEET.—A despatch of the 7th inst., from St. John, Nfld., says: A heavy gale from the north-east has been blowing since noon yesterday, with mountainous seas, but it is moderating now. Thirty sealing schooners are inured in a field of ice in the northern part of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and their crews are reported to be starving. Assistance will be immediately despatched to them. On the evening of 12th inst., the Methodist Sabbath School of Mount Stewart held a Concert which was a grand success. The Church was crowded with willing and anxious listeners, and received to their pleasure and profit. The various exercises of the evening consisted of Singing, Recitations, Reading and Dialogues. Great praise is due to the Superintendent of the School, also to the Scholars for the way they prepared and did their work. We hope they may be induced soon to give us another treat.

[June 14] GOOD FISHING.—Yesterday one of Mr. Churchill's boats hauled 300 mackerel caught with lines. THE steamer "M. A. Starr" arrived from Halifax at noon to-day. She sails on return this evening. THE German Government has sustained another defeat in the Reichstag, this time on a vote for barracks in North Schleswig, which was rejected by 97 to 119. THE United States Government has given permission to any of its naval officers who may wish to do so to join the Chinese service during the impending war. SEVENTEEN persons were killed and fifty-five wounded by the explosion in a powder magazine at Scutari reported on Saturday. The disaster was caused by lightning. L. C. R. FREIGHTS.—Six hundred and twenty loaded freight cars were handled at the St. John Station of the Intercolonial Railway during the week ending the 9th inst. THE Gaiety theatre at Manchester has been destroyed by fire. Fortunately there are no casualties to record, as there was no one in the building when the fire broke out. ON the occasion of the national fête on the 14th of July, the French Government will grant an amnesty to the persons now serving terms of imprisonment for participation in the Monceau-les-Mines riots. THE members of the Benevolent Irish Society are requested to meet at St. Patrick's Hall to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, sharp, to attend the funeral of the late Hon. Francis Longworth.—HENRY FITZGERALD, Secretary. THE nomination for North Brant, Ont., took place at Paris, Ont., on Saturday, when Messrs. Strickland and Young were entered for the contest. The former gentleman and his supporters were enthusiastically received. ONE of the leaders in the riots at Lingan, C. B., has been sentenced to ten months' imprisonment. The trials of the remainder of the prisoners have been postponed till the next session of the Supreme Court at Halifax. MR. LYTELL the actor, who visited Charlottetown last year in connection with the Fifth Avenue Company, will be in St. John, N. B., on Monday next. It is his intention to make a tour of the Maritime Provinces, and we hope to see him back again here before long. AN Ottawa despatch says that a scheme for funding the public debt is in contemplation by the Dominion Government, and that the visit of Sir Leonard Tilley to England is in connection with it. It is said that one feature of the change will be that the debt and interest will be made payable in Canada. CORONER McLEOD last night held an inquest to enquire into cause of the death of Daniel Butler, who fell dead at Mr. Theo. Farquharson's Store. The jury, after hearing the evidence given, came to the conclusion that the deceased Daniel Butler came to his death from natural causes. HIS GRACE ARCHBISHOP O'BRIEN visited Digby on Tuesday last, accompanied by several of his clergy, and in the evening administered the sacrament of confirmation in St. Patrick's Chapel. He will also visit Plympton, Clare, and Yarmouth. Digby is the first in the diocese, outside of Halifax, to receive the ministrations of Archbishop O'Brien. A FIRE occurred yesterday evening at six o'clock, in a house situated on Kent Street east, occupied by Mr. Philip Coyle. The engines went immediately to the scene and quickly extinguished the flames. Again at half-past eleven o'clock, a fire broke out in the same house. This time the building was reduced to ashes. The loss is estimated at \$200. We learn that the house was well insured. Cape Traverse Notes.

The produce shipping is about over now that the planting is finished. A small cargo or two might yet be gathered up. Mr. Alex. Strang cleared from Crapaud on Saturday last in the "Eshel Aggie," for Sydney, C. B., with a very heavy cargo, chiefly oats, seven or eight hundred bushels on deck; principally loaded here. We trust he may reach his destination safely. How is it an account of the shipping at Cape Traverse never appears in the papers. Quite a number of horses and fat cattle have been purchased by foreigners. All have to be taken to Summerside for shipment. There are still quite a number on hand. The weather is all that can be desired, and the crops are coming on with vigor. The foliage is about out in full, and the fruit and ornamental trees are in bloom. The well-cultivated fields, the orderly and systematic appearances of the farms, the comfortable buildings—and in several instances grand and expensive—all together, give the country, at this season of the year, a charming appearance. There is not a man in Cape Traverse today who is injured one cent by the National Policy, (except perhaps one or two rank old grits) might want to make a fuss. Farms that changed owners when we had reciprocity, could not be bought at the present time for five hundred per cent. over what was given at that time. The carriage used by the Duke of Montpensier at the coronation of the Czar is one of the most ancient and remarkable vehicles now in existence. It is more than one hundred years old, and is constructed mainly of glass set in a frame of richly chased silver. It is upholstered in blue velvet, embroidered with the arms of Castile and Arragon. Beneath the coachman's seat is a music-box, which formerly played as the coach moved, but which is now hopelessly out of order. This unique carriage, which appeared in public for the last time before the coronation at King Alphonso's wedding, has been one of the features of every great State festival at Madrid during the last three generations. 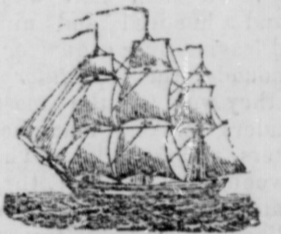
