

Summary of News.

The Canadian government have contracted for a semi-monthly line of steamers between Quebec and Liverpool, during the winter. The government is to pay the contractor \$50,000 a year for carrying the mails.—N&R.

The bands of the French army (says the *Journal de Maine-et-Loire*) has just received an organization which singularly improves the position of the instruments. A new coalition of Lords, Messrs, Russell, Wright, Gladstone, and Parnell, is still talking of Palmerston writing to the Earl of Shaftesbury to accept the vacancy of Colonial Secretary, but his colleagues oppose it. The name of Lord Darnley is also mentioned in the *London Times* has a noticeable Editorial respecting American expansion. The Times says, the English Government is having no opportunity of reinforcing the West India Colonies, and thus interposing a powerful barrier between Britain and the North American continent.
