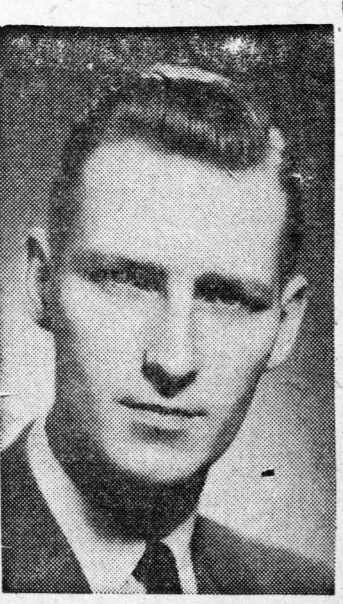

CANADIAN SPEAKS AT N.Y.

Smith Stresses Economic Influence On Politics

NEW YORK (CP) — External Affairs Minister Sidney Smith said Wednesday the United States and Canada should realize that economic matters have political effects in the modern world.

Addressing the Council on Foreign Relations of New York, the Canadian minister traced the upsurge of underdeveloped countries since the Second World War and said it is only natural that they seek better income for their peoples.

"From a distance they see the shining glint of North American standards of living and North American and Western European factories," he said. "Their natural appetite is for these evidences of national and material maturity.

"There are bound to be conflicts and problems, particularly in terms of trade relationships.

"The leaders of the Soviet Union publicly state that they make no distinction between political and economic means in pursuing their foreign policy objectives. We have tried to keep them separate without much success."

DISCUSSES RELATIONS

The text of the minister's address was released to the press before delivery.

On Canada - U.S. relations, Smith said there is no "magic salve" that can heal injuries on either side but "we must employ an intelligent and positive approach to each problem as it arises."

In view of world changes and vastly increasing international responsibility, the U.S. and Canada "must assess our problems in the light of the current situation and not seek refuge in panaceas of a bygone day."

Inspector, Teacher Return From Conference At Toronto

Mr. Louis Herring, school inspector and Mr. Wendell Horton, teacher at Queen Charlotte High School have returned from Toronto where they attended a Canada-wide conference of school superintendents and inspectors. Meetings were held at the University of Toronto. Mr. Horton was one of three representatives of the Canadian Teachers Federation, but as the other two were employed in the office of the organization, Mr. Horton was the only actual teacher present.

This was the sixth annual conference and covered the period from May 12 to May 30.

Studied during the conference were the problems of educational leadership in local communities, and topics discussed ranged from programs for the continuing education of teachers in the schools, through the relationship of the superintendent or inspector to the school board, school principals, to the reorganization of school districts and ways and means of insuring the highest possible level of instruction in a period of severe teacher shortage.

"Perhaps the greatest value of this course," said Dr. K.F. Preuter, superintendent of public schools, Etobicoke Board of Education, "lies in the opportunity it provided for the intercommunication of educational ideas and practices between widely separated areas in Canada."

Seventy (50 per cent) superintendents and inspectors of schools from Canada's ten provinces attended the conference.

Mr. Nowlan, replying to a question asked Tuesday by James R. Tucker (L — Trinity — Conception), said the Messer show had been carried on the CBC Maritime regional TV network, as well as on a national radio network.

"It had been hoped to put it on the full national TV network, but unfortunately negotiations were not successful."

The radio show, however, would continue throughout the summer and autumn.

Diocesan Reports Presented As Anglican Sgnod Meets

A gain of 23 members in the Diocesan Board of the Women's Auxiliary of Prince Edward Island during 1957 was noted by Jean R. Peake, Diocesan Corresponding Secretary in her report presented yesterday afternoon at the 85th Annual Session of the Synod of the Diocese of Nova Scotia.

Miss Peake went on to say that with the addition of these 23 members a total of 991 members are now enrolled in the Auxiliary.

Other reports presented at the afternoon session were: Report of the Diocesan Board of Missions presented by John Stead, Clerical Secretary; Report of Diocesan Church Society of P. E. I. Presented by Archdeacon G. R. Harrison; Report of the Women's Auxiliary of Nova Scotia presented by Gertrude M. Carter, Diocesan Recording Secretary; Report of Missions to Seamen presented by Chaplain B. J. Williams and The Report of the Bishop's Committee on Layman's Work presented by the Chairman H. Vincent.

This is the first time in the history of the Diocese that the Synod has been held outside the province of Nova Scotia.

At the morning session The Most Reverend F. H. Waterman, M.A., D. D. Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, speaking in regard to this unique situation whereby the two provinces come under the same Diocese, said that "We do not intend to go into the question as to whether Prince Edward Island is officially a part of the Diocese of Nova Scotia. So far as we are concerned, certain features mark the relationship between the two provinces."

RETIREMENTS

A number of changes were mentioned in Diocesan officers including the retirements of the Venerable John Stead, B. A., D.D., who was ordained as a Deacon in 1911, a priest in 1912, came to the diocese in 1926 and since that time has given a distinguished life to the church; and Reverend Frisby Smith, Rev. Smith on his retirement in June will relinquish the triple responsibilities of Hospital Chaplain, Port Chaplain and Assistant Priest of the Cathedral Church of All Saints.

Bishop Waterman also announced the appointment of R. Pullar of the Church Army as Port Chaplain. The appointment was made by Dr. Leonard Itfield, the General Secretary of the Council.

It was also recently announced that the Rev. Edmond Brookes Gabriel, L. Th., Rector of St. George's Church, Halifax, has accepted the appointment as a full-time Hospital Chaplain.

Bishop Waterman, in his charge, warned those present of the lack of interest in religious education in the church today. He said that although we are not tied to the mechanics of the church system of three centuries ago when children were catechized in front of their parents and friends, it is well to recognize the basic assumptions.

CHRISTIAN HOME

"It assumes religious education as rooted in a Christian Home. It assumes a worshipping family. Where either of these are abandoned we are in danger."

Specific mention of the Ninth Lambeth conference, to be held within a few weeks, was made by Bishop Waterman who said that the Fathers of the church who the Fathers of the church who the place and responsibility of the Anglican Communion, in the World Church and its Mission to the World.

He said that it is against the background of the history of the church that "we as a Synod, must carry on our deliberations and make our resolutions."

In concluding his charge, Bishop Waterman said that "we need to learn to give as God gave for us; holding nothing back." His two reasons were; because Christian giving is essential and because the work of the Church in Parishes, diocese and elsewhere, is being hampered by out too-low standard of giving.
