Four Star Concert Artists Are Popular Entertainers

An outstanding musical program will be presented at Norte Dame Academy next Thursday evening when the Four Star Concert Unit from New York City appear in Charlottetown under the auspices of the Knights of Columbus.

One of the reasons for the unusual successes of these artists is the fact that their music generates an air of relaxation. Mr. David Whelan of the Whelan Enterprises Inc., who books arrangements for these artists, writes "In our programs the music first must be of the variety which entertains and therefore it must be melodic."

Mr. Whelan also promised the audience would hear a number of Christmas selections and of course some Irish music.

He writes that the whole program is truly music for the people as all good music really is. "Any music which requires a master's degree in the arts to enjoy, is not truly good or should we say great music for great music is understood, without explanation by the one."

The first piano selection on the program is a medley of Chopin themes. Among selections the audience will hear are The Blue Danube, Caprice Viennois, The Widmung, a German art song and three parts of "La Boheme," the most melodic and moving music ever written.

"In this new unit, we have a program of musical entertainment which will top anything presented by any competing group. These artists will give five times the entertainment over what was approved in last season's presentation."

This musical program also stands in a class by itself due to the fact there are four accomplished entertainers so that the audience has a wide variety of entertainment.

The four are Francis Flanagan, the violinist; Wesley Swails, a tenor; Elizabeth Devlin, a lyric soprano from Hollywood; and Severin Turel, the pianist.

Wesley Swails looks enough like Gordon MacRae and sounds enough like Mario Lanza to live the interests of the teen-agers. He is tall, dark and thirty-ish and has more than 300 performances in 12 major operas to his credit.

Of one of Mr. Swails' recent concerts, the Jefferson City (Missouri) "Tribune" reviewer wrote: "By his vocal mastery alone, Mr. Swails certainly has few equals among tenors considered the best in the world of concert and opera."

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Three Sentenced In Acid Blinding

NEW YORK (AP)—Two men convicted in the acid blinding of labor writer Victor Riesel were sentenced Friday to five years in prison. A third defendant was sentenced to two years.

They were accused specifically of conspiring to obstruct justice by helping Abe Telvi, 22, flee arrest after he allegedly hurled the acid at Riesel outside a Broadway restaurant April 5. Telvi later was found slain.

Federal Judge William B. Herlands gave the lightest sentence—two years—to Leo Telvi, 26, Abe's brother, who contended he acted out of love for Abe.

The five-year sentences went to Gondolfo Miranti, 37, an alleged "finger man" in the plot, and Domenico Bando, 47, an intermediary.

Herlands also fined Miranti \$10,000.

A jury returned the guilty verdicts Thursday after deliberating 88 minutes.

An over-all indictment charges eight men with conspiracy to obstruct justice by attempting to intimidate a prospective witness—Riesel—from testifying before a federal grand jury.
