SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—After a 10-day voyage from Genoa, 1,300 Hungarian immigrants landed here Monday from the liner Ascania, inaugurating a new passenger service between Italy and Canada. Soon after disembarking, about 270 left by special train for new homes across Canada. The others will follow today and Wednesday. The 20,000-ton Ascania, gay with hunting, brought a recorded greeting from the mayor of Rome, Umberto Tupini. On her return voyage the liner will carry a recording in reply by mayor W. W. Macaulay and other Saint John citizens.

### Comet Visible During This Week

NEW YORK (AP)—A comet discovered only last November will be visible low in the northwestern evening sky for a week beginning Monday night. The Hayden Planetarium said the comet will appear near the horizon about 90 minutes after sunset and should be visible for about half an hour. Each succeeding evening it will be higher and about as bright as the faintest of the seven stars in the Big Dipper. The sky visitor is the Arend-Roland comet, discovered Nov. 8 by Sr. Arend and M. Roland of Belgium's Royal Observatory.

# British Beat Russia With Letters On Suez Situation

LONDON (Reuters)—The British government Monday disclosed that Russia warned Britain and France not to attack Egypt seven weeks before British-French intervention began in Suez.

The government released the texts of letters exchanged last September and October between the British prime minister Sir Anthony Eden and Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin.

In a letter dated Sept. 11, Bulganin referred to apparent French and British readiness to attack Egypt, and added: "The Soviet Union cannot stand aside from this question. We wish to warn you in a friendly way of the dangers which might follow, if the necessary prudence is not shown."

Eden in reply five days later, said Bulganin's letter seemed based on a "complete misconception of the position of the British government" and contained "certain errors of fact."

# Old Guard Is Elected At U.K. Congress of Communist Party

LONDON (Reuters)—A four-day congress of the British Communist party ended Monday with victory for the old-style leadership and the crushing of a "rebel" faction demanding a more independent policy and freer speech.

The Communist congress re-elected to the party national executive Chairman Harry Pollitt and Secretary John Gaellan. One of the rebels, in a speech to the party congress, described this leadership as "Stalinist."

The Russian action in Hungary followed the "eye-opening" of many party members last year with the revelation of the crimes of Stalin.

The congress heard that 7,000 members had resigned in the last 12 months, leaving the total party membership at 27,000.

### NEW METHOD REJECTED

The congress turned down by a vote of 472 to 23, with 15 abstentions, a minority report which advocated a new method of electing the national executive and more say for the rank and file in the formation of policy.

### CHALLENGE FROM REBELS

Against this background, a handful of party rebels this weekend challenged the party's executive.

### NO DECLARATION
