## Pearson Urges All Speed In Getting Force Into Egypt

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) UN Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold announced Friday that first units of the U. Middle East police force would fly to an Italian staging area "probably within 24 hours."

# Highways Department Has Busy Year, Varied Program

Trans Canada Highway construction was pushed forward this year with special vigor because original agreement with the Federal Government expires this year, said Highways Minister, J. George MacKay yesterday.
