"Life is real, life is earnest; And the grave is not its goal: 'Dust thou art, to dust thou shalt,' Was not spoken of the soul."

So sang the poet Longfellow of a man as an immortal. A writer of our own day has drawn attention to Jesus' resolute refusal to treat man as if he belonged only to time.

After Jesus had fed the hungry 5,000, the enthusiastic throng wanted to take Him by force and make Him their King. He evaded them for the time being, and when again he faced them, He offered Himself to them as the Bread of Life, assuring them that anyone who ate this Bread would live forever.

To Jesus the most ordinary person has a capacity for God which He came to develop: the Creator created him for unending union and communion with Himself. This present life is therefore, only a stage in the career of an immortal whose destiny is eternity.

This fact that one regards the life here a preparation for the life to come does not belittle this present existence; instead it magnifies it. The man who serves ultimate ends in everything he does will serve immediately and more efficiently than he would if he had only the interests of the moment in view.

The fact that Christ rules one's daily living insures his fidelity. He is a man who can be trusted. His word is a good as his bond because Christ commits the person. He leads to principles universal and eternal in their scope, and these principles govern his dealings.

Loyalty to Christ demands efficiency. The servant's gifts and opportunities are talents entrusted to him, and he must give account to Christ for the use he makes of them. The one talent man of Christ's parable did not squander his talent like the Prodigal Son; he just buried it, and his failure to use it was his condemnation.

But let them remember that neither a hundred millions, nor a hundred billions of dollars can make the traffic respectable. It can be glamorized, for a price, on the printed page, but in reality it is a curse second only to war.
