

S'SIDE WELCOMES VISITING ODDFELLOWS

82nd Session Of Grand Lodge Grand Encampment And Rebekah Assembly Will Also Meet Next Week In Prince County Capital.

Oddfellows from all parts of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland will gather in Summerside next week for the 82nd annual session of the Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., the 48th annual session of the Grand Encampment, and the 37th session of the Rebekah Assembly.

Summerside Oddfellows are making extensive preparations for entertaining the visiting members, estimated to number some 800. In a foreword to the published programme of the conventions, Grand Master A. O. F. Gill extends fraternal greetings and recalls that when the sessions of Grand Lodge were last held in Summerside in 1892 the organization was a mere infant, comprising some fifty-one lodges. At that time the Grand Encampment of this jurisdiction was instituted and the first session held. The Rebekah Assembly was only a dream at that time, being instituted eleven years later.

During the intervening years, rapid progress has been made, until today the number belonging to the Order in this jurisdiction (comprising the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and the Dominion of Newfoundland) is more than eleven times that which claimed membership in 1892.

Cordial greetings are also extended in the programme by Premier Campbell, His Worship J. E. Campbell, and President S. G. Merriam of the Summerside Board of Trade.

The Programme

The programme opens at 7:30 p. m. on Monday with a special assembly of Rebekah Assembly to deal with the reports of the credentials committee and confer assembly degrees. This will be followed by a band concert at 9 p. m. on Remembrance Square.

Tuesday will be taken up with special sessions of the Rebekah Assembly in the Garden and sessions of the Grand Encampment in Oddfellows' Hall. The conferring of the degree of chivalry will be at 6:30 p. m. and of the degree of Patriarchs Militant at 7:30. A special session of the Grand Lodge will be held at 7:30; exemplification of Rebekah Degree will be at 8 o'clock.

The opening session of Grand Lodge and the third session of Rebekah Assembly will be held on Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock. At 11 a. m. a public welcome by Mayor Campbell and government officials will be given in the High School auditorium.

Guests of Premier Campbell

Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 a memorial service will be held in Trinity United Church and at 2:30 the representatives of Grand Lodge and Rebekah Assembly will be guests of the local lodges at an outing to be held at Premier Campbell's summer home at Stanley Bridge, at which address sees will be given by Special Deputy Grand Sire, Robert B. Groat, of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

This will be followed in the evening by the fourth session of Rebekah Assembly and second session of Grand Lodge, the activities concluding at 10 o'clock with a reception and dance at Maple Leaf Garden.

On Thursday the third session of Grand Lodge and meeting of District Deputy Presidents Association will be held at 9 a. m., followed by a noon luncheon and conference of Grand Lodge officers and newly appointed District Deputy Grand Masters.

At 2 o'clock the fourth session of Grand Lodge will be held in the High School auditorium, the evening being devoted to the annual meeting of the Trustees of the

Maritime Oddfellows' Home, Picou, N. S., in the Oddfellows' Hall.

CLEAN AGAIN

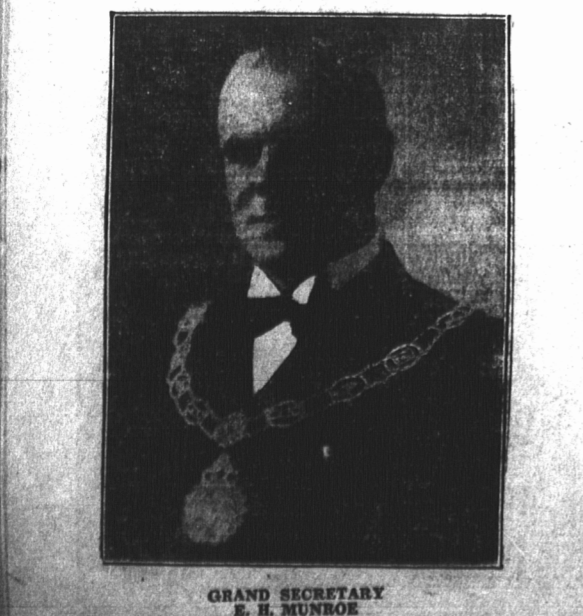

TO CORRECT THAT DOUBLE CHIN
