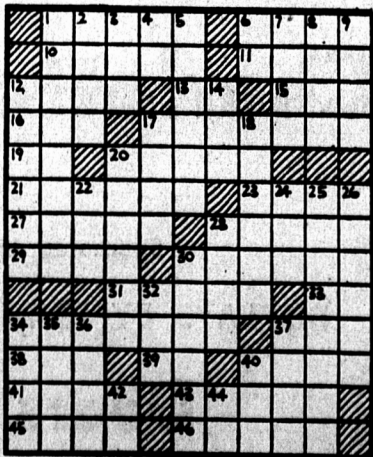

SEEKING PEACE? ROME, Sept. 18 — (AP)—Rome's independent Giornale D'Italia said today in a London dispatch that North Korean authorities are seeking to negotiate for peace.
