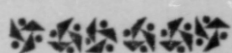

Adulterated Wine.

STRASBURG, Feb. 2.—The Government is determined to stop the adulteration of wines in Alsace, and its campaign in this direction has revealed the fact that this illicit industry was flourishing to a degree unimagined. Within thirty days five persons have been tried and sentenced for the crime. The latest to suffer is the wine merchant Vogel, of Colmar, a large exporter, who was found guilty of sending adulterated wines out of Germany, and was sentenced to a fine of 10,000 marks (\$2,380.)

The Naval Reserve.

St. JOHN'S, Nfld., Feb. 2.—The naval reserve movement proposed by the British admiralty is making headway among the Newfoundland fishermen. About five hundred have already enrolled themselves, and the colonial authorities expect as many more before the end of the present month.

MINISTERS OFF TO WASHINGTON

To Consult With Their Colleagues

WHO ARE NEGOTIATING THE RECIPROCITY TREATY

Regarding the Extent of Concessions to the Americans.

OTTAWA, Jan. 4.—Yesterday five Ministers, Messrs. Fielling, Mills, Blair, Borden and Sifton, left for New York where they are to take council to-day and Sunday with their three colleagues who are negotiating the treaty at Washington.

The object of the meeting is to learn the terms of the proposed treaty and to consider how far the three Knights would be justified in going in conceding to the Americans.

Spiritualism.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—A movement is on foot here to put the practice of spiritualism very much upon the same footing as the practice of medicine. It is proposed to establish a collegiate institution for the formal instruction of "mediums," and to provide for the authorized licensing of mediums capable of constructing orthodox sciences.

The new scheme owes its origin to a Mrs. Stannard. Her object she says, is to protect the public from experimenting with fraudulent and incompetent spiritualists.

Famine and Massacre

MOSCOW, Feb. 2.—The famine in Persia is growing more desperate, and the Shah, alarmed for his personal safety, has increased his bodyguard. In and around Tabriz, in the northwestern neck of Persia, between Turkey and Asia and the Caspian Sea, the famine-stricken inhabitants have taken to pillage and highway robbery. They have besieged the municipal authorities of Tabriz, clamouring for bread. According to the latest advices received here, the police of Tabriz are powerless to put down the insurrection, and the Christian residents in Persia are fearful of a general massacre.

THE FENIAN RAID MEDALS.

Eight Thousand Claims Have Been Filed.

OTTAWA, Feb. 4.—A board has been appointed to consider claims for the general service medal for Fenian raid and Red River veterans.

Col. Aylmer is chairman. Eight thousand claims have been filed.

Two Claimants.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—A curious dispute has arisen over one of the provisions in the will of the late Baron Ferdinand de Rothschild. He left \$25,000 as a bequest to a certain Herbert Wilson, and a peculiarity arises over the fact that there are two Herbert Wilsons, both of whom are willing to accept the legacy.

Herbert Wilson No. 1 bases his claim upon the following clause in the will:—"To my friend Herbert Wilson, of No. 166 Cromwell road and the Travelers' Club, the sum of \$25,000." There is no such number as 166 Cromwell road, although the Baron's executors consider the fact of Herbert Wilson being a member of the travellers' Club sufficiently identifies him as the legatee.

Herbert Wilson No. 2 is in the business as an hotel negotiator at Bloomsbury mansions. He saved the late Baron from a dangerous fall in 1853, and feels that the bequest was intended for him.
