A McKenzie-Cauchon letter to the King-
ton (Ont.) Whig, of late date says:—
"The probability is that the Government
will, DURING NEXT SESSION, VERY
MATERIALLY INCREASE THE
TARIFF in order to meet the requirements
of the times."

INFORMATION FOR ELECTORS.
In order that electors may be posted on
the arrangements under the Ballot System
of the Dominion, we print again the direc-
tions of the law. They are as follows:—
The voter is to vote only for one candi-
date unless two voters are to be returned
for the Electoral District, in which case he
may vote for one or two candidates as
he thinks fit.
The voter will go into one of the com-
partments, and with a pencil the provided,
place across opposite the name or names of
the candidate or candidates for whom he votes
his X.
The voter will then fold the ballot, so as
to show a portion of the back only, he will
go to the envelope, which he will give
to the assessor in the usual way, and deliver to
the Deputy Returning Officer, who will place it
in the ballot box. The voter will then place
his X on the envelope, and return it to the
Deputy Returning Officer, who will be satisfied of the
fact that he has given his ballot.
If the voter votes for more candidates
than he is entitled to vote for, or places
his X on the envelope, or on the paper or envelope
by which it is enclosed, he can return it to the
Deputy Returning Officer, who will be satisfied of the
fact that he has given his ballot.
If the voter takes a ballot paper or en-
velope out of the polling station, or fraud-
ulently puts other paper into the ballot
box, he will be subject to a fine of not more
than five dollars, or imprisonment for a term not exceed-
ing six months, with or without hard labor.
The following will be the form of the
ballot with the mark opposite to the name
of our favorite candidate, the best man:—

James C. Pope, Charlottetown, County of Queen's
William Welsh, Charlottetown, County of Queen's

As there may possibly be some mis-
apprehension among City voters, it will
be well for them to pay particular attention
to the following quotation from the notice
of the returning officer:—
"And for Charlottetown, Common and
Royal, there shall be
SIX POLLING DIVISIONS,
the first of which shall comprise and include
all those parts of the City of Charlottetown,
lying North of the South of Richmond Street
and West of Great George Street, and the Poll
shall be taken at or near King Street, near the
Bank of Prince Edward Island."

THE SECOND POLLING DIVISION
shall comprise and include all those parts of
the City of Charlottetown, lying North of
Richmond Street and East of Great George
Street, and the Poll shall be taken at or
near the New Engine House, near King
Street, near the Bank of Prince Edward Island."

THE THIRD POLLING DIVISION
shall comprise and include all those parts of
the City of Charlottetown, lying North of
Richmond Street and South of Fitzroy Street,
which are to the East of Great George Street,
and the Poll shall be taken at or near the
Market House, Queen Street, near the
Bank of Prince Edward Island."

THE FOURTH POLLING DIVISION
shall comprise and include all those parts of
the City of Charlottetown, lying North of
Richmond Street and South of Fitzroy Street,
which are to the West of Great George Street,
and the Poll shall be taken at or near the
Market House, Queen Street, near the
Bank of Prince Edward Island."

THE FIFTH POLLING DIVISION
shall comprise and include all that part of
the City of Charlottetown, lying North of
Richmond Street and South of Fitzroy Street,
which are to the East of Great George Street,
and the Poll shall be taken at or near the
Market House, Queen Street, near the
Bank of Prince Edward Island."

THE SIXTH POLLING DIVISION
shall comprise and include all that part of
the City of Charlottetown, lying North of
Richmond Street and South of Fitzroy Street,
which are to the West of Great George Street,
and the Poll shall be taken at or near the
Market House, Queen Street, near the
Bank of Prince Edward Island."

MORE GRIT FREE TRADE.
Our contemporary the Watchman re-
marks that "The Mackenzie Government
are finding it hard work to reconcile their
supporters everywhere to their tariff policy.
In Montreal Mr. Mackenzie left nothing
undone to elect a Protectionist and suc-
ceeded in getting Mr. Workman in. In
St. John his supporters had a Free Trade
and Protection by turns and it appears
that Minister Burpee in his late canvassing
visit to St. John assured the manufacturers
that their position would soon be improved
by Protective tariff. In P. E. Island the
Liberals are working energetically to convince
the electors that the Government is all for
Free Trade, while another Government
organ, the Kingston, Ont., Whig, says:—
"Whatever dissatisfaction (with the Gov-
ernment) exists in manufacturing constitu-
encies is due to the Government of Protec-
tion. Many staunch Reformers are in-
clined to favor an increased tariff, and will,
if necessary, give their support to Opposi-
tion candidates in order to express their
opinion on this one subject."
