The Halifax Battalion. WINNIPEG, July 10. The Halifax Battalion arrived here yesterday. They will go home after the review.

Covering the Deficit. LONDON, July 10. Parliament has passed a resolution to temporarily cover the twenty millions deficit by issuing Treasury bills.

A Grand Review of the Troops. WINNIPEG, July 10. A grand review of the troops returning from the Northwest will be held here on Monday, the 13th inst., by General Middleton.

Sunstruck. HALIFAX, July 10. Four of the Royal Irish Rifles were sunstruck on the Commore yesterday. They wore glengarrys, and yesterday being the hottest day of the year, was depressing to the troops.

A Thrilling Experience. HALIFAX, July 10. Capt. Coady and the crew of the St. John, N. B., brig Emily Raymond, arrived from Newfoundland yesterday, after being twice wrecked within a fortnight, and having a thrilling experience.

Horrible Tragedy. PARIS, July 10. Architect Candray, although married and having children, maintained a liaison with Madame Benier, wife of a shopkeeper, and who had an amiable husband, and dutiful daughters. The lovers quarrelled, and during the shopkeeper's absence, Candray called upon Madame Benier, and with pistol, shot her dead, and then ended his own life by putting a bullet through his heart. Benier soon afterwards returned. The revelation of the wife's infidelity came to him so suddenly, that his mind broke down and he fled from the scene, a raving maniac.

Revenue Changes. OTTAWA, July 10. The following despatch has been issued to Collectors of Inland Revenue. On and from the sixth inst., you will collect the following Excise: Spirits per proof gallon, \$1.30. Malt Spirits per gallon, \$1.32. Molasses Spirits per gallon, \$1.33. Tobacco and all kinds plug and cut cavendish per pound, 20 cents. Moist Snuff in five pound packages and over, 14 cents. Tobacco, home manufacture, 5 cents. Cigarettes in twenties and less, 35 cents. Geneva gin, rum, whiskey and unenumerated articles of like kinds, a specific duty of \$1.75 per imperial gallon, and on brandy a specific duty of \$2. Refined sugar of all grades of standard, a specific duty of one cent a pound and 35 per cent. ad valorem.

Trading in young Girls. LONDON, July 10. The excitement over the exposure of London's secret vice made by the Pall Mall Gazette continues unabated. The demand for papers is enormous. Large crowds surround the publishing office and extra police have been ordered to protect the Gazette building from being approached by persons having no legitimate business there. The Crown lawyers are considering the advisability of prosecuting the publishers of the Gazette. Their decision is awaited with anxiety.

The Gazette this evening publishes an editorial, thanking the city authorities for attempting to suppress sales of the paper thereby breaking the conspiracy of secrecy maintained by the press concerning the Gazette's revelations.

"The police seizures of the newspapers are common in Vienna," continues the Gazette in its article, "but such high handed outrages on the freedom of the press should have been impossible in London. Instead of waging war against street boys, let the authorities take action against the responsible parties in this business. If we have published anything obscene let them prosecute us. We deny that anything has been published by us deserving that course, and we declare that the authorities are cowards or worse if they fail to proceed against us after having charged in open Court that the Gazette was an obscene publication. We reluctantly adopted this mode of publication in order to arouse men to a just sense of the horrors existing all around them. Now, the more publicity the better. We are prepared to prove our statements. We can summon witnesses, from the Dean of Canterbury and the Prince of Wales down to Mrs. Jeffreys. We will put our chief informant and his assistant in the witness box. Let those who do not wish to shake the very foundations of society, think twice before compelling us to confront in court brothel keepers with princes of the blood, and prominent public men with victims of their lawless vice.

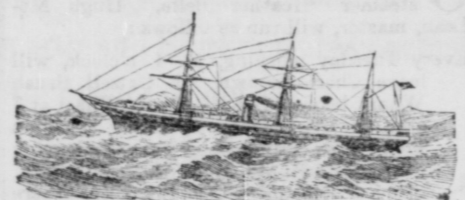
