Quebec Students Set For One-Day Boycott Today

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal student leaders Wednesday predicted a one-day classroom boycott in Quebec province universities today will be effective. The walkout was planned to draw public attention to demands of students for more provincial aid to education. "It'll be pretty successful judging from the atmosphere at McGill," said Louis Donolo, McGill Student Association president. A student official at Sir George Williams College here said classrooms will "be almost empty." The situation was expected to

be the same at the University of Montreal. University heads generally have disapproved of the strike and have announced classes would be held as scheduled. The students decided on the walkout after submitting a brief to Premier Duplessis asking for increased grants and bursaries. They also sought a meeting with the premier, but he declined saying the brief was under study. The three other institutions involved were Laval University at Quebec City, Bishop's College in Lennoxville and the University of Sherbrooke. Some 21,000 students would be affected. Referendums were held in all six universities to see whether students felt the strike should be prolonged. Laval and Montreal voted for it, McGill and Bishop's against while voting at Sir George and Sherbrooke—reported heavy—was continuing late Wednesday. The bogy of a student demonstration that turned into a destructive riot in December, 1956, is bothering most student leaders. They have urged undergraduates to stay at home.
