OTTAWA, Jan. 19.—(Special)—Neither the Federal Department of Transport nor the Canadian National Railways has or has had any intention of transferring the management of the Borden-Toronto ferries from Canadian National Railways to Canadian National Steamships. Assurance of this principle has been given by respective heads of the Transport Department and the C.N.R. to J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal member for Prince and parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister James Sinclair.

It arose from a charge that "a black steer" claimed by Mr. James Edmund Jewell, who has a farm adjoining that of the accused, strayed from his place and a similar type steer was afterwards seen on the farm of Mr. Cahill.

A jail break, involving four prisoners, was reported from the Prince County Jail at Summerside early this morning. His keys were taken from him. Then he was locked in a cell and the prisoners departed. Three prisoners in an adjoining cell assisted in raising the alarm. They shouted time after time, hoping to attract attention, particularly from a nearby house. Finally they succeeded and the alarm was raised. Jail authorities said the four who escaped were: Enson Perry, Donnie (Wick) Gallant, Jackie (Slink) Gallant and Fred (Mouse) Peters. All were serving jail sentences.

ROYAL CANADIAN MOUNTED POLICE were heading up a wide-spread search, it was reported. The men were believed to have been lightly clothed when they escaped.

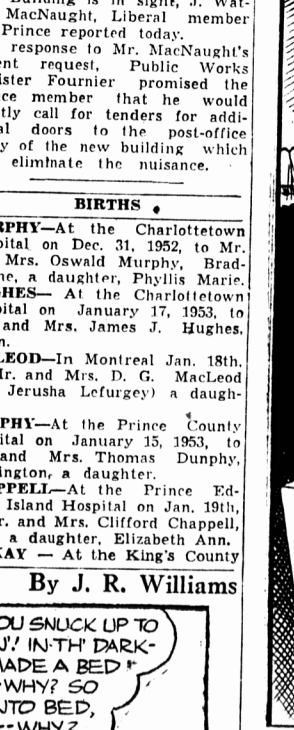
Mr. MacDonald added it is generally agreed that the supply of potatoes is not greater than this country needs, and it is likely that during the next two months there will be substantial export shipments made. He based this on the fact that in most past seasons the Island has marketed more potatoes than February 1, than will be available this year.

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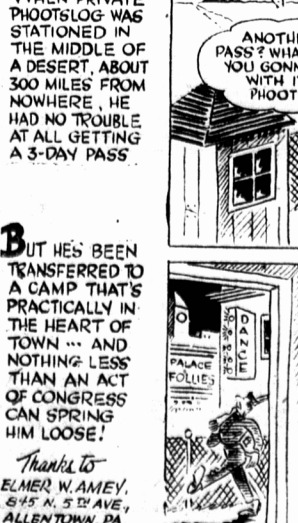
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
