COOK'S CORNER

WALNUT CAKE

2 1/2 cup shortening
1 cup white sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
3/4 cup milk
1 cup walnuts (finely chopped)
1 teaspoon almond flavouring
4 egg whites

Cream shortening, gradually add sugar, beat until fluffy. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk; add nuts and flavouring. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into greased pan 8" x 8" x 3 1/4" lined with brown paper. Bake in moderate oven.

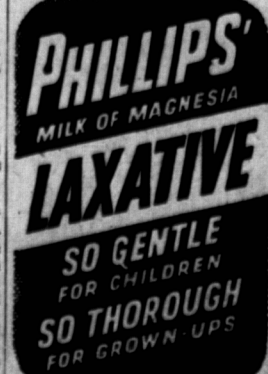
