Let's Talk It Over

Service clubs and individuals not connected with the clubs, who are engaged in the commendable business of helping the youth of our community, sometimes deal with young people who do not seem to show any response for the care and attention spent on them. This is naturally pretty discouraging to those who have worked hard and expected better results.

The leaders should not feel too greatly disheartened, however, as a faithful service among young people never fails to bear fruit even if some of it seems to fall on stony ground. We can't expect 100 per cent returns on such an investment. The boys and girls who remain unsolved problems are the ones whom people talk most about, forgetting that for every one of these, there are probably five or more who have derived lasting benefit from the service given.

We have had in Summerside for the past two years a young man who, both by his teaching and by his example, has exerted a profound influence on some of the youth of our town. The fact that he is able to teach them how to slide into a base, or drag a bunt down the third base line is, as far as this discussion is concerned, relatively unimportant. But he has talked to these boys about their problems, and advised them wisely against pitfalls that they are bound to encounter. We have talked to parents who are deeply appreciative of what he is doing.

The fact that two or three of his proteges have failed to live up to his expectations, and have seemed to bring discredit to his efforts, should not discourage him unduly. For them, "Operation Big Switch" is the only language they understand, and as they have apparently escaped this operation in their tender years when it would have done the most good, they will probably meet it in a much more unpleasant form in later years.

The young man we've been talking about is Johnny Carroll, coach of Summerside baseball team. We hope he can be with us in future summers. The money it takes to bring him here is being well spent.

Operational Training Unit To Operate From Summerside

The R. C. A. F. Operational Training Unit (O.T.U.) now based at Greenwood, N.S., will be moving to the R. C. A. F. Station at Summerside in November, following the departure of the Air Navigational School from Summerside to Winnipeg towards the latter part of September. To learn more about its specific duties and what the O.T.U. may mean to the Summerside Station a group of swimmers from Summerside visited the unit at Greenwood yesterday.

While providing a comprehensive explanation of the role played by the O.T.U., officials at the station would not confirm an earlier report that the rescue unit at Greenwood would also be transferred to Summerside; nor would they confirm the report that a section of the Fleet Air Arm might be stationed at Summerside.

Nothing definite could be learned as to the number of personnel that might be coming from Greenwood and while it appeared that the number might be less than that recently based at Summerside, it was pointed out that more ground crew personnel would be needed per plane in such branches as maintenance, armament, photography than is now required per plane for navigational training.

The Operational Training Unit which will be moving from Greenwood to Summerside is equipped with four-engined Lancasters and approximately ten of these large aircraft were brought from Greenwood with the unit.

The O.T.U. course of approximately four months is for the purpose of training pilots, navigators, radio operators and engineers to work together as a highly trained team. After graduating from O.T.U. they are transferred as crews to one of the Maritime Reconnaissance Squadrons (M.R.S.) it is the responsibility of M.R.S. to

provide long range aerial protection against submarine attacks on convoys and coastal shipping operations in the Western Atlantic. Greenwood at present has four flying units: the Number 2 Operational Training Unit, Number 404 and Number 406 Maritime Reconnaissance Squadron and Number 103 Rescue Squadron. The transfer of the training unit to Summerside will leave only fully trained units at Greenwood.

In training, the aerial exercises carried out simulate as closely as possible operations such as would be required of a Maritime reconnaissance squadron during war-time. These exercises include interception and escorting of ships, bombing and gunnery practices and tactics and procedures in carrying out anti-submarine operations. The navigational training at Summerside has consisted of two schools: Air Navigational School (A.N.S.) where student navigators received training leading to graduation and their navigators' wings and Central Navigation School (C.N.S.) where advanced navigation is taught. The A.N.S. which will move to Winnipeg after the middle of September will be followed by the C.N.S. when adequate accommodations can be made available although there is no indication as to when this might be.

It is expected that Group Captain Kenyon, commanding officer at R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, will remain in command of the Summerside Station, while W.C. J. W. Ellis, officer commanding No. 2 Maritime Operational Training Unit, Squadron Leader C. N. Stanley, chief flying instructor; S. L. V. Rolfe, chief ground instructor; and F. L. R. Pattillo, in charge of maintenance will be coming from Greenwood to Summerside with the O.T.U.

Service Voting Results By Parties And Provinces

(By The Canadian Press) The Liberal Party received 65.2 per cent of the service vote cast in the Aug. 10 general election, well ahead of the 48 per cent they received in the civilian voting.

Approximately 105,000 members of the armed services were eligible to vote. A total of 52,234 cast ballots and the Liberal party got 34,074.

The Liberals topped other parties in all provinces including Ontario where they received 11,443 service votes, compared to 4,500 for the Progressive Conservatives. The PC party received 20.7 per cent of the service vote compared with 31 per cent of the civilian vote. The CCF polled eight per cent as against 12 per cent in the civilian tabulation. The Social Credit party got 4.4 per cent, compared with 5.2 per cent.

The Labor-Progressive Communist party and other scattered groups received 1.7 per cent of the service vote.

The Canadian Press compilation of the civilian vote on election night totalled 5,230,469. Following is the service vote by provinces:
