Fresh Cottage Cheese Suited To Spring Menus

Along with spring, for some of us, comes an urge for cottage cheese. Perhaps this is because it actually tastes better now than at other seasons for the milk from which it is made comes from cows pasturing on new grass.

Dairy counters gleam with jars and cartons of cottage cheese mixed with various flavorings such as minced chives, chopped radishes and grated carrot.

VEGETABLE DRESSING

"We all know these springtime forms of cottage cheese taste wonderful with green salads," I remarked to the Chef. "But how many persons use cottage cheese as a dressing for hot vegetables? Eat enough and no meat is needed in the meal, for cottage cheese contains enough protein to be an honest alternate to meat."

"And the food value does not vary with the time it is presented in the meal," the Chef observed. "In France we serve strawberries with *coeur de creme* for dessert. You know, those little heart-shaped cheeses that resemble American cottage cheese in taste. The French prize this spring diet and serve it in a basket lined with fresh green leaves."

DELECTABLE PUDDING

One of my friends, Mrs. Sonia Rosenberg, made a delectable Central European pudding based

on cottage or pot cheese for me. She is the mother of two brilliant daughters, both concert artists. Irene is a pianist, appearing in concerts throughout the country. Sylvia, a violinist, is appearing this season on the continent with symphony orchestras of Holland and London, too.

"When my daughters were teenagers at home, practicing and studying for their careers," Sonia explained, "they sometimes had little appetites for meat. I often prepared a cottage cheese pudding which, in the form of a delicious dessert, provided full protein value to balance a meatless meal."

Measurements are level.
Sonia's Cheese - Noodle Pudding: Cook 1 (8-oz.) pkg. high-protein egg noodles according to pkg. directions.

Meanwhile separate 3 eggs. Beat whites stiff, yolks until creamy.

To yolks, add 1/2 c. each sugar and raisins, 1-lb. cottage cheese, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. each ground cinnamon and nutmeg, 1-3 c. melted butter and 1 grated unpeeled apple.

Drain and add noodles. Fold in egg whites. Transfer to well-buttered 7 1/2-qt. baking dish; dot with 2 tbsp. butter.

Bake 1 hr. in mod. oven, 350 degrees F., or until firm. Serve warm or cold, with cream or raspberry sauce or fruit compote.
