



**WATER STREET IS WIDER**

Several improvements have been made on Water Street in Summerside which have added greatly to the appearance of the street and to traffic control in this busy shopping area. The first of these changes be-

gan with the adopting of parallel parking on both sides of the street followed by the installation of underground wiring, and the narrowing of sidewalks area to provide more street width for motor traffic. This has resulted in a nice
