GENTLEMEN: In redemption of my promise, effectually to refute the lies which were fabricated in Charlottetown, and circulated throughout the District, regarding me, before the Election, I beg to annex a correspondence, between the Hon. Peter Macgill, of Montreal, and me. In addition to the very important offices which you will perceive, by my letter, that gentleman fills, I may remark, that he is one of the most eminent merchants of London and Canada—stands first on the list of Councillors in the united Parliament of Canada, and than whom there is no one more consulted by the Governor General. I was well known to Mr. Macgill for many years, before I settled here; and you will observe, that my vindication is most complete; but all the waters in the Gulf will not wash away the stain which the necessity for this correspondence has engrained on the previously faded character of the parties alluded to in my letter.

NEW LONDON, PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND,
26th July, 1842.
Sir: When I retired from business in Montreal, I intended to pass the rest of my days in some quiet retreat, in the peaceful pursuit of Agriculture. That retreat I imagined I had found in this Colony—but I have been mistaken. My politics being, as probably you are aware, the integrity of the British Empire, above all private or party considerations, I very soon perceived that loyalty to Britain could not long co-exist with the pretended claims of the land speculators of this Island, and expressed myself freely upon the inevitable consequences. The cry of treason was immediately raised by the united government and land-speculating parties, who, by their interested oppression, are severing the affections of the hitherto, most loyal people in North America from our parent country; and I have been held up by them, publicly and privately, as a fugitive Canadian rebel and bankrupt. These clumsy charges would afford me more amusement than annoyance; but, having been elected to represent in Parliament the most populous district in the Colony, I am desirous that my constituents should be put in possession of the real state of the case; and there is no person to whom I could apply for that purpose of so high authority as you, Sir, who are, at the same time, Chief Magistrate of the great commercial city around which the rebellion spent its fury, and President of the wealthiest banking institution, I believe, on the American continent.
I, of course, publicly contradicted the aspersions; but such is the character of the parties alluded to, that I have been told Honorable Councillors did not deem it degrading to insist among the electors that my contradiction was false; and I know that Charlottetown sent forth, a day's journey, her Magistrates, with a foot in the grave and a lie on the lip, to reiterate the calumny at the hustings. In short, were this a place for stating all I know, you would be convinced that the corruption and falsehood of the late Canadian clique would "whiten in the shade" of the political demoralization of the petty oligarchy which misrules this fertile, but fated Colony.
These purblind mortals, in the attempt to brand me as a rebel and bankrupt, have effectually established (what they little intended) that the direst oppression that ever affected the colonists of any nation is doing its slow but certain work, and producing a change in the spirit of the people. The character of a rebel, which they most injudiciously thrust upon me, carried me triumphantly to the head of the poll, without having solicited a single vote, and in spite of every opposition, fair and unfair—a very indicative fact, which I feel certain you, Sir, will neither forget nor fail to interpret rightly, should the state of the Lower Provinces ever become a subject of discussion in the Councils of the Canadian Parliament.

MONTREAL, 27th August, 1842.
Sir: I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 26th ult., the contents of which have not a little surprised me. In reply, I beg briefly to observe, that the aspersions which have been thrown on your character, and the reports which have been circulated to your disadvantage, by some persons in Prince Edward Island, and to which allusion is made in your communication, are altogether—as far as my knowledge extends—without any foundation whatever. During the late unfortunate troubles in this Province, I believe, and am convinced, there was not in it a more loyal man than yourself—one who evinced more zeal and anxiety to preserve order and put down rebellion, to uphold the laws, and maintain the authority of Government.

With respect to your commercial standing in this community, your various establishments enjoyed the confidence of the public; their credit and respectability, and your own, personally, I never heard impeached; and in place of leaving this country a bankrupt, I have always understood, that you had retired from business in easy and comfortable circumstances.

requis to keep the existing Roads in repair for a few years would construct entirely new ones upon the proposed system, which, when finished, would not only be much more useful to the country, but could also be kept in repair for less than half the expense of the present ones. But look at the plan pursued in the neighbouring Provinces. There, at the consideration of the original expense does not prevent the construction of new Roads on an improved system. As an instance of this, I will remark that the entire Road from Dartmouth to Pictou—nearly 100 miles in length—has within a few years been made entirely new, at an aggregate expense of about £10,000, solely to avoid the irregularities and hills which existed in the former line. And the Post-Road from Truro to Amherst is reconstructing at present, over entirely new ground, at a similar expense, and for the same reasons.

Another objection urged by some against changing the sites of the Roads, is, that the existing Roads are generally thinly settled, and it would be prejudicial to the interests of the settlers to alter them. To this I reply, that in many instances it would not be requisite to vary the Roads materially from their present situations, as level ground could be found nearly always in their immediate vicinity, and in some instances the changes would be in favour of the settlers; but in cases where material alterations took place, the existing Roads could be continued for the convenience of the settlers, who, being chiefly farmers, derive no other great advantage from the Roads than as a means of getting to mill and market with the produce of their farms.

On the whole, Sir, it appears to me, that our present system of Road-making in this Island is decidedly bad; that in this particular (as in many others) we are far behind the neighbouring Provinces; and that we stand very much in need of an improved system of Road construction, and of some competent persons to conduct it.

A good many horses were in the market, but from the scarcity of hay this season, purchasers did not seem disposed to give high prices. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor graced the fair with his presence, together with a number of other gentlemen from Charlottetown. On the whole, things went off as well as could be expected for a beginning, and it is to be hoped that the Fair will be continued annually hereafter.
