

Religion and Life

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Dr. Lynn Harold Hough told this story in a sermon here some years ago. A man went out for a ramble up a steep hillside and took his little son with him. As he started out he tried to take the lad's hand, but the little fellow was too independent to accept help. He toddled along, stumbling over this stick and tripping by the fence until a fall on a stone brought a bleeding knee and a call for his father's help. He lifted him up and wiped away his tears; the father said, "I never intended you to climb this hill alone," and hand in hand they walked the rest of the way.

Christ never intended us to climb life's rough road alone, and last week we spoke of Him as the all-sufficient He-er-able to meet the deepest needs of the individual. To many of us Christ is a necessity for the common day; we could not live without Him.

But Christ means much more to the world than this. He is Saviour and also King of Kings and Lord of Lords. For example, take a few truths about Christ from publications which came to my desk last week and which exalt Him as Saviour and also as Lord of all life, and as Judge, the Arbitrator of Destiny.

First, a word from an English preacher which connects last week's testimonies with the thought of today: "The Resurrection was the luminous and victorious consummation of the Cross." It revealed the highest and deepest in the Divine and became a new creative force in human experience. The Christian Church is a new creation, not by water and the Word but by the mystery of Redeeming Love. The Creator of the Church is the Person of the Redeemer. He is not an idea expressed in a creed, but a Saviour realized in experience."

A Bishop of the United Church of South India takes us a step farther: "Must we not confront the world, which has all but lost the sense of any ultimate standard of judgment, with the truth that it has a Judge, a Judge and a Saviour, who has come and will come again? . . . The Judge is also the Saviour of the world. It is because the eternal Judge, who will at the end both pronounce and carry out the final judgment on all human history, has visited us here in time and bound us by faith to Himself, that we have a message with which to confront the world."

Many more similar confessions might be added from the literature of the present hour, but these express for them all the dependence of humanity on Christ and their authors' recognition of the truth that He and none but He, has the right to rule.

To many nations today these affirmations of Christ's absolute authority are just meaningless; some openly defying His authority, others ignoring His laws. They have been experimenting with dif-

ferent ways of life. Christ's teaching that love is the only law to which the human spirit can submit is treated as utterly unpractical in a rough-and-tumble world. They have put their trust in physical might instead. Their experiments are on a proving the truth of Christ's teaching. Violence calls forth violence in return. As Jesus put it: "They who take the sword shall perish with the sword." In twentieth century terms should this not read: "Those who resort to atomic bombs shall perish by atomic bombs."

Look at the facts. Just before Dr. John MacNeill of Toronto left the army in France to take part in the Y. M. C. A. appeal for funds across Canada in 1918, he addressed a number of meetings and asked the men for a message to the folks at home. A quiet looking fellow in a far corner of the hut after long hesitation said: "Tell them to see this thing through. If it is necessary for anyone to leave a little of Canada in the soil of France in order that future generations may not have to go through this anguish again, I am ready; but let us finish this sort of thing for all time."

Our men fought and died in a war to end war. That war led to a worse one, and now we are threatened with a third, worse still. If tyrants are bent on forcing war on us in order to bind us in chains, we may have to accept it, again, but only to turn the tyrant back. War can never establish the Kingdom of love. Only obedience to Christ's law of love can bring in the new order for which we pray because the nature of the means determines the character of the end. Christ is King, whether we acknowledge Him or not. A great East Indian once exclaimed, "None but Jesus, none but Jesus is worthy to wear the diadem of India." We may add: None but Jesus none but Jesus is worthy to be crowned King of the nations.

Christ is also Judge of the nations. Jesus said, "The Father . . . has given all judgment to the Son." (John 5:22). At the end of the age all will be called to account before Him, but judgment is always in process, and this is a period of judgment. Consider the ways in which Hitler and Mussolini had their own deeds brought home to them! Do not let us imagine that, because the free nations were God's instruments in bringing His judgments home to them, we can escape the same. In so far as we transgress we too shall answer to the Judge of all. Babylon was God's instrument of judgment on disobedient Israel, but when the victors turned justice into blind vengeance, they too were brought to book for her crime. So it will be with those who sin today—even with the most highly favored of the ages. And such we are.
