

IN MEMORIAM

JOHN BERTRAM KNOX

Victoria and surrounding communities suffered a severe loss and many hearts were saddened through the untimely passing of John Bertram Knox following a tragic accident at the Charlotte-town Airport on July 18.

He was born in the village of Victoria, Prince Edward Island, October 10, 1916, the only child of James Knox and his wife Miss Mary Jackman, who passed away when John was just a very young lad.

He grew up to young manhood possessed of a fine personality of honesty and uprightness, and in the home was one of the most dutiful of sons, and a loving and devoted husband, father. In the United Church of which he was a member his place was seldom vacant and at all times he manifested an interest in its advancement in the community he was always ready to lend a helping hand and take an active part in any good cause.

Upon his return he was engaged in the general store of Wright Bros., Victoria with his father-in-law, Mr. Miner MacNeven, until three years ago when he joined the M. C. A. M. as Aero Engine Mechanic, later being transferred to M. C. A. receiving his engineers license, and where he had been employed up until the time of his passing. He was one of the leading hockey stars of the one time famous Victoria Union which won the Maritime Championship, a member of the Victoria Branch of Canadian Legion, and Past Master of True Brothers Lodge A. F. and A. M. Craipaud.

His funeral which was held on July 19, at Victoria United Church was largely attended by his relatives and friends who had come to pay a last tribute of respect to one who was held in very high esteem. Services were conducted by Rev. R. H. Baxter of the church at Victoria, and Rev. Frank MacLean pastor of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown who preached a very solemn and inspiring sermon, bringing a beautiful message of comfort and hope to the bereaved ones.

Hymns sung were "Rock Of Ages," "The Lord's My Shepherd," and "Safe In The Arms of Jesus," and a solo "Sometime We'll Understand" by Mr. Norman MacDonaid, with Mrs. Allison Lea, organist of the church, presiding over the music. At the graveside in the beautiful Craipaud Cemetery, the impressive Legion and Masonic services were carried out, the Last Post being sounded by Bugler Chaisson.

Spirit Wins As Girl Battles Lake Ontario

By RICHARD K. TAYLOR Canadian Press Staff Writer ABOARD TUG NED HANLAN, Toronto (CP)—Marilyn Bell, the first person to swim across Lake Ontario, was near collapse as she reached Ontario Thursday night. The 16-year-old schoolgirl was too exhausted to talk.

The stark drama of what the race cost the petite, 119-pound girl was lost to the thousands of spectators who jammed the beach on the far side of the breakwater where Marilyn ended her endurance test.

As they screamed and applauded their delight, Marilyn swam in aimless circles near the breakwater, about 50 yards from shore. She appeared dazed; near the breaking point of exhaustion.

The Ned Hanlan followed a few yards behind the blonde swimmer on her 32-mile trip. Newspaper men and officials of the Canadian National Exhibition saw her arduous swim stroke by stroke, kick by kick.

It wasn't until Marilyn's girl friend, Joan Cook, who had been in the accompanying dory, jumped fully-clothed into the water that Marilyn seemed to orientate herself near the breakwater.

She reached the dory and tried to pull herself into the boat. She collapsed back into the water on the first try. She tried again. Once more she sagged back. This time willing hands pulled her aboard.

A steady 50-stroke-a-minute swimmer Marilyn appeared as chipper at dawn Thursday morning at the half-way line as when she started.

That was soon to change. Shortly after 11 a. m. she appeared to be weakening. Her steady strokes were more slaps at the water than precise motions.

A night and a day of relentless swimming finally wore Marilyn down. During the afternoon her speed dropped from two miles an hour to a fraction. At times she seemed barely to be holding her own.

The water, which had calmed overnight, started to kick up again. It seemed impossible for her to succeed. But the stroking went on, broken more frequently for rest or nourishment.

Several times Marilyn stopped, only to start once more after a brief rest. The swim had become a struggle between exhaustion and the cold water on one side and the spirit of a young girl on the other. The spirit won.

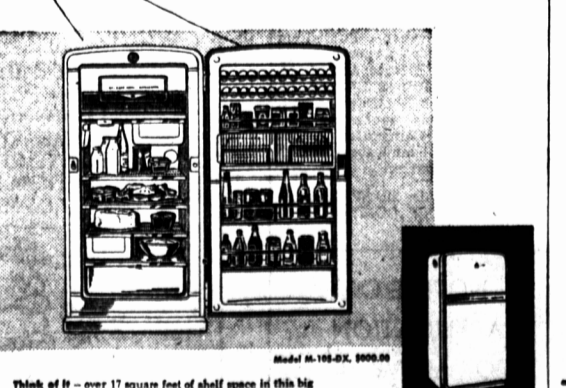
