

Islanders Obtain New Forward From Ottawa

Claude Robert, an outstanding forward with the Ottawa Senators in the Quebec Professional League, has been obtained by the Islanders. It was announced here last night by coach Wes "Bucko" Trainor.

Robert is a versatile forward who can play either wing. He has seen considerable experience in the Quebec League and is highly rated not only as a hockey player but also as a team man.

He should be here late this week possibly in time for Friday night's game against the Miners or for the game in Glace Bay Saturday night.

The latest Islanders acquisition is a high priced player.

Trainor also received some disconcerting news when he learned that a player named Rindino in Sudbury had decided to retire from hockey. The Islanders coach had expected to land him and had made the player an offer and worked out with Sudbury Wolves but could not come to terms with the Sudbury team.

There is no further word on John Bailey. Last night Trainor wired the Saskatoon Club seeking information concerning the player. He believes that the player may be on his way but thinks it strange that no word has been received from him.

Greenshirts' Fans Find Thirteen Regulars Missing

KITCHENER. (CP)—Hockey fans here needed a program to spot members of their junior Kitchener Greenshirts Tuesday night. Thirteen regulars were missing in a game against Toronto Marlboros.

Players began leaving for other clubs Tuesday night on the impetus of Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League, who bought a controlling interest in the club last week. The result has been meetings and ruffled tempers among hockey officials in Ontario and Quebec.

There were reports from Kitchener that the Ontario Hockey Association club, in third place in the nine-team Junior A circuit, would disband after Tuesday's game because of money troubles. These were denied by Frank Selke, Canadiens managing director.

"They're unfounded," he said in Montreal. "But if the club doesn't get better support from the fans, it may have to disband later."

Meanwhile, Torrey Gregg of Wingham, Ont., OHA president, held an emergency meeting of the executive and Junior A council here to discuss the club's future.

He said the OHA will try to force Canadiens to bring the 13 players back to Kitchener, and to find out why the OHA was not informed of the move.

Gelineau Not Pleased With Chicago Deal

CHICAGO. (CP)—Jack Gelineau, Quebec Aces goalie called up to substitute for ailing Al Rollins in the Chicago Black Hawks net, was quoted Tuesday as saying he was pressed into service despite injuries and that the Hawks "treated me with complete indifference."

Gelineau, who won the National Hockey League's rookie award with Boston Bruins in 1950, was goalie for the Hawks' last two games, both with Detroit Red Wings who scored 18 goals against him.

The Chicago American said that Gelineau, before leaving for Quebec, stated:

"I'm in no physical condition to play hockey and the Quebec management told Chicago vice-president Bill Tobin that last week when they sought my services. For two weeks I've been troubled with strained tendons in both hip joints and I also suffered a sprained ankle."

Still Insisted

"Tobin was told all this, but he still insisted. He even threatened to recall Rags Raglan and Ken Wharram, two players the Black Hawks have on option at Quebec if I didn't answer his summons. He said he needed a name player with previous big league experience and practically demanded Quebec send me—or else."

Tobin Tuesday denied that he threatened to recall Raglan and Wharram.

"I don't care to comment further," Tobin added. "But Gelineau played every game with Quebec Aces until we recalled him. So he couldn't have been hurt too badly."

Gelineau also told the newspaper that everybody treated me like a stranger when he reported to the club in Detroit.

"When we arrived in Chicago Sunday morning, I was left to work out my own problems, including trying to get a hotel reservation," Gelineau was quoted as saying.

Chicago coach Sid Abel said he couldn't figure out why Gelineau thought he was treated like a stranger.

"We went to two stations in Detroit to meet him on his arrival," said Abel. "But we missed him. In the dressing room at game time he was introduced to the players."

"He's not a kid and doesn't have to be led around by hand. As for his play with us, about anybody could have done as well or better. He did one of the worst jobs I've seen in years."

Much Disturbed

"The OHA is much disturbed and Kitchener fans are up in arms," he said. "We're going to find out why this thing was done behind our back."

Selke denied Canadiens were violating any Canadian Amateur Hockey Association regulations in ordering the transfer of Greenshirt players to four junior clubs in Quebec and one in Ontario.

"The players belong to us and it is up to us to see that we meet our obligations to them."

George Dudley, secretary-manager of the CAHA, agreed.

Brooklyn Dodgers Re-sign Coaches

ATLANTA. (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers of the National Baseball League Tuesday re-signed coaches Billy Herman and Jake Pitler for one-year terms.

Cookie Lavagetto, the third of three coaches on the 1953 Dodgers club, announced his resignation earlier and is expected to join Charlie Dressen, former Dodger manager and now with Oakland in the Pacific Coast League.

Walter Alston, Montreal Royals manager who succeeded Dressen at Brooklyn, said he expects to announce the signing of a third coach within a few days. The third man will be a pitching coach.

Lumber Kings' Coach Resigns

PEMBROKE, Ont. (CP)—Frank (Bulch) Stahan, former defenceman with Ottawa Senators in the Quebec Senior Hockey League, has resigned as playing coach of Pembroke Lumber Kings of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association. Club officials announced Tuesday.

Winners of only four games in 20 starts this season, the Kings are in last place in the five-team circuit. Inability to land some players, help which would have lengthened the team is one of the chief reasons for Stahan's resignation.

Jack Carthy, also a veteran operator in the QSHL, has taken over coaching duties until a new coach is named.

Earlier this season, Stahan obtained an injunction permitting him to play with Pembroke despite a Canadian Amateur Hockey Association ruling that he was the property of Senators and could play for no other team. An appeal by the CAHA was to be taken before the Supreme Court.

New Yorkers Look Undressed Without Papers

NEW YORK. (CP)—People on New York subways somehow don't look completely dressed these mornings. The reason? No newspapers.

The photo engravers strike which has forced the seven New York dailies to stop publication is most apparent in the underground transit system.

The trains are so noisy they discourage conversation at any time. There's little outside but darkness. As a result, New Yorkers bury themselves in a newspaper while going to and from work.

Folks in this city buy about 5,000,000 papers on a normal day and on a crowded subway train in rush hour the absence of the same newspaper leaves a powerful light bulb without a shade.

Atlantic Provinces Sea Cadets Take Proficiency Awards

TORONTO. (CP)—Sea cadet corps in the Atlantic Provinces scored a clean sweep in the senior and junior proficiency competition of the Navy League of Canada.

The league announced Tuesday the Nelson Corps of Halifax was first in the senior competition for corps with more than 100 members. Second was the Terra Nova corps of the John's Nfld.

In the junior competition for corps with less than 100 members, first and second places went to Cornwallis corps of Digby, N.S. and Noble Corps of Bridgewater, N.S.

Vancouver won the senior trophy last year.

The Gibson Cup for attendance in senior corps, awarded for the first time this year, was won by Rodney Corps of Saint John, N.B. The cup commemorates the long service of David Gibson, president of the Navy League from 1938 to 1951.

Nansimo, B. C., won the junior attendance trophy and Atlantic corps of Beine-Grand Banks, Nfld., was second.

Officers' swords will be awarded to Lt. Cmdr. J. E. McNaughtan of Halifax and Lieut. C. McBridge of Digby, N. S., commanding officers of the Winnipeg junior and senior corps.

David H. Gibson of Toronto was elected an honorary life member of the league.

Critical Of Ghost Riders

VANCOUVER. (CP)—The British Columbia Automobile Association has criticized Vancouver's "ghost riders"—traffic constables wearing civilian clothes and driving unmarked cars.

The ghost squad is part of a police drive against traffic offenders, which started two weeks ago. Since then, four persons have died in car accidents, bringing Vancouver's toll this year to 38, four more than the total for all of 1952.

The association adopted a resolution "doubting the advisability of using officers not clearly identifiable as police."

Traffic Superintendent Gordon Ambrose of the police department said methods used so far are mere "child's play" compared with "the steps we are prepared to take" this week-end.

Director-General Of FAO Retires

ROME. (Reuters)—Norris E. Dodd, 74-year-old former United States undersecretary of agriculture, announced his retirement as director-general of the United Nations Food and Agricultural Organization at its conference today.

Some 1,500 persons, including 500 government delegates from 70 countries and 1,000 FAO staff members, gave a standing ovation to Dodd, who has headed the organization's day-to-day work for 5 1/2 years.

Dodd, visibly moved by the ovation, told the conference: "I firmly believe that FAO is the best implement of peace—better than tanks or guns. And FAO is trying to bring a little happiness and prosperity to the hungry and undernourished at less cost than a battleship or a fleet of planes."

The conference will elect Dodd's successor to the \$18,000-a-year post later this month. At present there are two candidates: Dr. Phillip Cardon, 54, agricultural scientist, who has been put up by the U.S. government, and Dr. Fritz Wahlen, 54, head of FAO's agriculture division, candidate of the Swiss government.
