New Ballets Are Planned

LONDON (CP)—Celia Franca, artistic director of the National Ballet of Canada, announced Monday that the company has obtained the choreography for three new ballets which it hopes to stage next November.

Miss Franca and her assistant, Grant Strate of Edmonton, fly home Wednesday after 16 days of gruelling work with the new ballets, *Death and the Maiden* and *The Mermaid* and *The Merman* by Andree Howard and Pineapple Poll by John Cranko.

During their stay, Miss Franca and Miss Strate have had to learn 43 different dance roles between them.

She described *Death and the Maiden* and *The Mermaid* as "sincere and sensitive ballets." "There is nothing chi chi about them, which is refreshing in these days of neuroticism in the theatre."

BASED ON JOKE
Miss Franca said Pineapple Poll is based on a huge joke about the Royal Navy. "I think

all these will be popular in Canada and the United States." "Aside from learning individual dance roles, Miss Franca and Miss Strate have had to learn ballet patterns for the corps and characterization. They also have to absorb the style and the settings." "Now we're taking care of the details such as writing letters to designers and phoning composers. REGARDS CANADA AS HOME"

London-born Miss Franca, who founded Canada's National Ballet in 1950, now regards Canada as her home.

"I have my life's work there and have grown to love it. "I seem to miss England more when I come back to it than when I am away from it. But I probably appreciate it more now that I am not living here."

Miss Franca, who gave her last public performance in February this year, said she has no regrets about not dancing any more. "I've so much to do on the artistic side and arranging tours, that I just do not have time for it."

Successful Year Is Reported By P.E.I. Agricultural Branch

The annual meeting of the local branch of the Agricultural Institute of Canada was held in Charlottetown Tuesday.

Two new members were introduced to the group Douglas Munro, a member of the Institute of Agronomy of Alberta who has recently joined the staff at the Experimental Farm where he will be engaged in soil research, and Stewart Eagles of New Brunswick who has been transferred here by the production service.

The main feature of the meeting was a discussion on a proposed act respecting agronomists for the Province of Prince Edward Island. This project has been under consideration for some time, and it was unanimously decided at yesterday's meeting to prepare an act similar to those in effect in other provinces for presentation at the next sitting of the Legislature.

Such an act would give the same protection to persons qualified to join an Institute of Agronomy as medical men have under their Medical Association.

J.E. Arseneault was elected president for the year 1959-60. The vice-president is S.C. Wright and J.D.E. Sterling was re-appointed secretary.

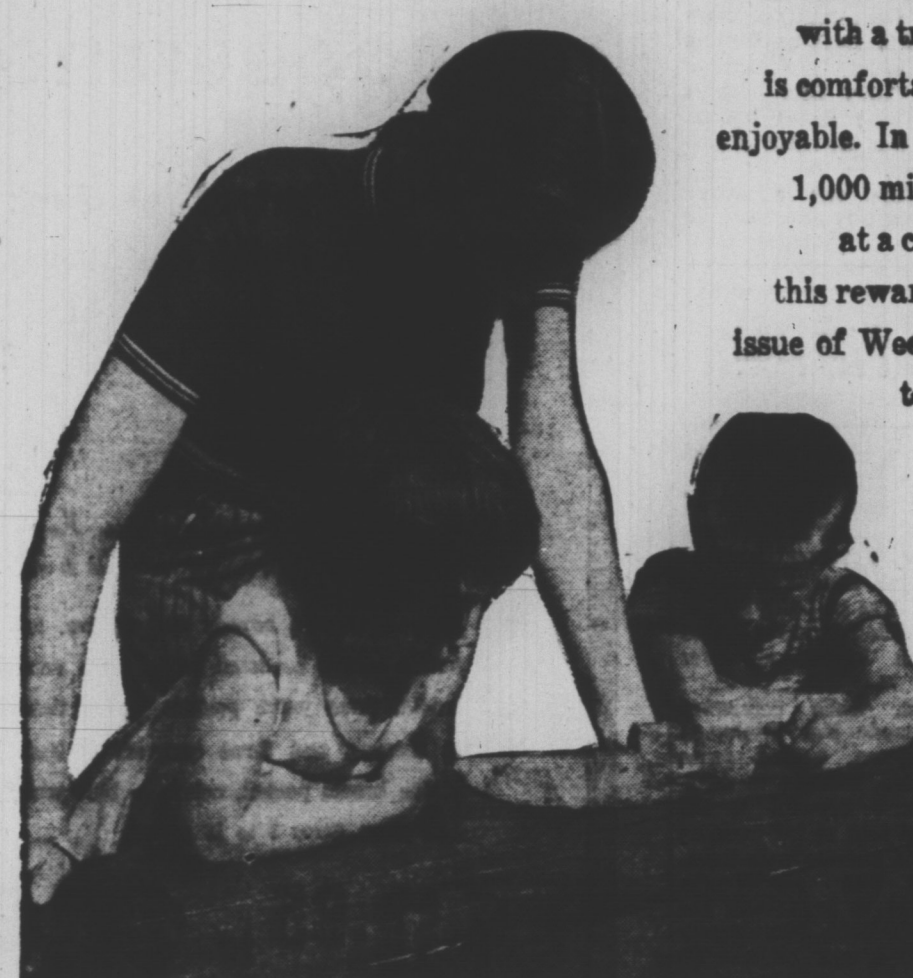

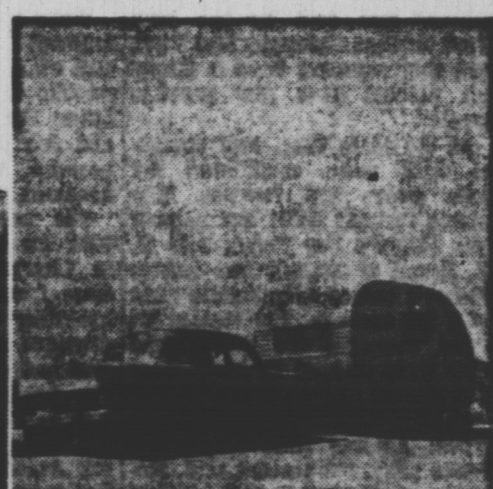
