Eden Anxious To Hold Talks With Eisenhower

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Eden would like to visit Washington soon to review thoroughly with President Eisenhower all allied policies in Europe, the Middle East and Asia, an aide said Wednesday.

Eden told a group of visiting U.S. congressmen he would be delighted to make the trip if an early opportunity arises, the aide said.

But he stressed that no official statement has been taken by either the British or U. S. governments to arrange a transatlantic trip by the prime minister.

The seven American congressmen, led by Senator Mike Mansfield (Dem. Mont.) had urged Eden to come to Washington for a talk with the president.
