

Scores Four Goals

Schurman Powers Aces To 7-6 Victory Over B.Y.C.

Sparked by Paul Schurman's 4-goal performance the Summer-side Aces overcame an early 3-0 lead to defeat the B.Y.C. 7-6 at the Sports Arena last night and chalk up their first win in Island League play.

Schurman was the man in motion for the Aces as he fired a pair of first-period goals after Lloyd Shepherd and Spy Ready had given the youth clubbers a 3-0 lead before the 14 minute mark had been reached. The sturdy Summerside forward added another in the second and his fourth marker proved to be the winner at 11:52 of the third period.

It was a blistering fast game, the best of the year as both teams went at each other with no quarter given and none asked.

Taylor, MacArthur and Grady were the other Summerside snipers. Big Jack (Spy) Ready was the big man for the B.Y.C. firing three goals, and despite Schurman's four goals was the best man on the ice for either team. Lloyd Shepherd, Brian Lewis and Merrill Pineau scored the other goals for the B.Y.C.

ALL SUMMERSIDE

It was Summerside all the way in the second period as they outscored the B. Y. C. 4-1 and take a 6-4 lead into the third. Taylor and Grady teamed up to catch the B. Y. C. defense flatfooted and Taylor was the triggerman as Benny sent him into the clear after only 41 seconds of the period had elapsed. Four minutes later Ron MacArthur rifled a shot from the blue line that dented the net immediately following a face-off.

Summerside took full advantage of a B. Y. C. penalty to Joe Coyle and Paul Schurman stole a puck off a B. Y. C. player to give the Aces a 5-3 lead.

Ready got the B. Y. C. back into the game as he got a clear breakaway from his own blue line after breaking up a Summerside attack. Glen Gamble who stopped a lot of pucks for the Aces didn't have a chance.

Only 20 seconds after Ready's goal Benny Grady and Edgar Taylor teamed up again and this time Grady was the marksman.

If the pace was fast and furious in the first two periods it was even faster and more furious in the third. Brian Lewis made it a 6-5 game at 2:49 as he deflected in Joe Coyle's drive from the blue line and after that the play raged up and down the ice with first one and then the other team taking turns testing the goaltenders.

Schurman's slap-shot was never working better and at 11:52 he once again put it to good use as he fooled Dillon from just inside the blue line on a shot that picked off the assist on Gord Cutcliffe.

With the Aces two goals in front the B. Y. C. plastered Gamble with shots from all angles. Finally Merrill Pineau slapped in Mousie Weatherbie's pass and the B. Y. C. were within one goal.

Brian Lewis missed a great chance for the B. Y. C. when he was sent right into the clear but his momentum was so great that he was carried behind the net before he could get his shot away.

The youth clubbers had face-off after face-off in the Aces zone and a number of pileups in front of the net but the Aces were hang-

ing on grimly with only the thought of protecting that one goal lead and shot away the puck at every opportunity. The B. Y. C. came heartbreakingly close to scoring when at 19:39 a puck actually went behind goaltender Gamble and rested right on the line. The red light went on but referee Gordie Kelly nullified the effort.

The 600 fans in attendance saw another real thriller and will no doubt be back for more.

As the first period opened it looked like it was going to be a rout as the B.Y.C. shot into a 3-0 lead and were outplaying the Aces badly.

Lloyd Shepherd shot the first marker for the losers on a slick piece of stick handling after taking a pass from Mousie Weatherbie at 5:12. Less than a minute later Spy Ready literally skated rings around the Aces as he grabbed the puck in the Summerside zone and circled the net twice before firing the B.Y.C. into a 2-0 lead. Spy was back again at 13:36 as Brian Lewis set him up on a goalmouth pass and Ready tipped it into the net.

But the Aces had not yet begun to fight and with Paul Schurman leading the way the scoreboard read 3-2 less than two minutes after Ready had notched his second goal. Schurman netted his first goal on a backhander from about 100 feet out after taking a pass from Stan Gallant. His second was scored on a wicked slap-shot just inside the blue line. The period ended with the score 3-2.

NHL May Extend Draft System

MONTREAL (CP)—President Clarence Campbell of the National Hockey League said Thursday NHL teams are considering extending the draft system to amateur ranks.

The proposal was considered at a league meeting in New York Wednesday.

At present the draft is limited to players in professional ranks. Each club may sponsor amateur referees and hold property rights on the players until they move up into professional ranks.

Mr. Campbell said the teams now are wondering whether the weaker clubs should be given an opportunity to draft some of the better junior players, now exempt from draft regulations.

The matter will be studied between now and the January meeting of the general managers.

Nashua's Sale Brings A Record Price—\$1,251,200

NEW YORK (AP)—Nashua, the Belair Stud's big American champion of 1955, was sold Thursday for \$1,251,200—the greatest amount ever paid for a race horse.

The successful bidder was Leslie Combs II of Spendthrift Farm, Lexington, Ky. Combs told the executors of the estate of the late William Woodward Jr., that if he could get Sunny Jim Fitzsimmons, who trained Nashua for Woodward to take the colt again, he would "send him to Florida as fast as I can get him there."

Nashua would be pointed for the \$100,000 added Widener handicap at Hialeah February.

The entire Belair Stud racing stable was sold to three interests after the executors received sealed bids. The dispersal became necessary following the accidental shooting of Woodward at his Long Island home Oct. 30.

The total realized for all 62 horses including Nashua, was \$1,866,200.

Nine race horses and a dozen yearlings were sold to John Kroese of Teaneck, N. J. Mildred W. Woolwine of White Oaks Farm, Lexington, Ky., purchased 24 broodmares and 16 yearlings.

The previous record for a thoroughbred was \$700,000 for Tulyar, Irish colt who was undefeated in 1952 when he won the Epsom derby. The Irish National Stud bought Tulyar from the Aga Khan.

SECOND IN EARNINGS

Nashua, in two years of racing, has won a total of \$945,145 and stands second only to Citation in money-winnings. Citation earned \$1,085,760 throughout his career. Nashua eclipsed Citation's record for single-year earnings when he piled up \$752,550 in winning virtually all of the classics for three-year-olds.

It was believed, although not reported or confirmed by Bombs, \$1,000,000. However they declined to identify any other bidders.

Bargain Basement Buy Is Horse Of-The-Year

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Belle Acton, a \$1,500 bargain basement buy at the 1954 yearling sales, Thursday was named the two-year-old pacer of the year in the annual U. S. Trotting Association poll.

The daughter of The Widower, owned by George Landers of Kittery, Maine, won 15 of 21 starts, set a new two-year-old record of 2:02 2/5 in the autumn pace at Yonkers raceway, and polled 64 of the 90 first-place votes cast in her division by sports writers.

Quick Chief, owned by John Frolich of Brookville, N. Y., picked up 77 of 94 first-place votes to win the three-year-old pacing laurels, and the aged pacer tied to Adios Harry, owned by J. Howard Lyons of Greenwood, Del. The latter was the top choice of 75 of 96 writers.

Willie O'Ree Is On Sidelines

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)—Willie O'Ree, Negro left-winger from Kitchener - Waterloo Canucks of the Ontario Hockey Association junior A series who suffered a serious eye injury in a game at Guelph Nov. 22, is still on the sidelines.

O'Ree has rejoined the team for workouts, but the vision in his right eye is impaired, delaying his return to action, club officials said.

He has complained of "fuzziness" in his sight and doctors say only time will decide whether the injury will be permanent.

The 19-year-old player was struck by a puck on a slap-shot by teammate Kent Douglas.
