Association Of Nurses Gives Brief To Cabinet

Members of the Association of Nurses of Prince Edward Island yesterday presented a brief to the Executive Council informing Cabinet of the current studies being sponsored by the Nurses Association, acquainting them with trends in nursing education in Canada and requesting that the government spearhead the development of a master plan for higher education in Prince Edward Island.

The association recommends that a central institution be established in Charlottetown to offer a nursing education program, the purpose of which will be to give a high level of education by qualified and able instructors in an environment which is wholly educational.

That clinical experience in the learning of nursing care of patients be obtained primarily in the three existing hospitals which are presently offering programs in nursing education.

That the proposed nursing education program meet the qualifying standards in existing colleges in Prince Edward Island and that, where possible, selected parts of the course of studies be obtained at these three colleges.

MADE DECISION
The brief points out that the Canadian Nurses' Association has made the decision to discontinue school improvement programs in hospital conducted schools and has recommended that nursing education programs be established in educational institutions.

Canadian Nurses' Association is establishing a national accreditation program for schools of nursing, but will begin to accredit only those programs in educational institutions, it was stated.

In the provinces of New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario and Saskatchewan plans are in motion to dis-associate nursing education from hospitals' except for clinical nursing experience.

The presentation further indicates that two-year diploma programs are replacing the traditional three year hospital conducted diploma programs. In addition, three four year degree programs in nursing are being based in the universities.

In Quebec, as well, nursing education will be financed under

the general public educational system at the institute level through a three-year program. The first year of the program is centred on liberal arts courses and the last two years are concentrated on nursing and integrated sciences.

IMPLICATIONS
The foregoing trends in nursing education comply with the recommendations of the Royal Commission on Health Services in anticipation of a medical care plan for Canadians. The implications for P.E.I. are as follows:

Each of the three schools of nursing is open to the criticism of the royal commission on health services which applies to schools which still attempt to educate nurses by apprenticeship training.

If we do not go along with the Canadian Nurses' Association recommendations to move nursing education programs out of hospitals and place them in educational institutions, our programs will not meet accreditation standards.

If our future programs are not accredited we will not be able to recruit qualified students.

A shortened program in an educational institution will mean that our teachers will require a different orientation to teaching.

If nursing education moves away from financing under the Hospital Services Commission, where will financial support be found?

In order to prevent duplication of facilities and facilities, the Association of Nurses of Prince Edward Island looks forward to the establishment of one program in nursing education for the province.

CN Traffic Control Moves To Moncton

MONCTON (CP) — A single traffic control and dispatching system is to be introduced by the CNR in the Maritime provinces next July. E.J. Cooke, the railway's Atlantic region vice-president, said Wednesday the system will provide a new operations control centre here to streamline dispatching and operating of trains moving in the Maritimes.

Dispatching now is carried out from four points — Moncton, Halifax, New Glasgow and Charlottetown.

Under the new system, the Moncton centre will have all information on cars to be moved, as well as locomotives and crews available in the entire area.

The Canadian National Telegraphs microwave system would augment existing land lines in the new setup to provide an alternative means of communication to existing land lines.

Mr. Cooke said the central dispatching system will provide the railway in its campaign to improve its operations and the service to its customers. There would be no loss in employment among dispatching staffs which would be moved from New Glasgow, Halifax and Charlottetown to help man the new Moncton centre.

A total of 22 positions at these centres would be involved in the move to Moncton.

Cabinet Discusses Proposal

The Executive Council yesterday discussed a proposal to conduct their cabinet meetings in other sections of the province in order to allow all members to become more familiar with all areas of the Island and to allow all Islanders an opportunity of placing representation before the Cabinet.

Further details of the first such proposed Cabinet meeting will be released in the near future.

NEW CHURCH

A new United Church under construction in Passchendale, N.S. near Glace Bay is to be named the Newson United Church after Mabel Newson, a dedicated worker in the congregation and a deaconess. Miss Newson died in Charlottetown two years ago. She was a cousin of N.W. Lowther and Louis Lowther of Charlottetown and Mrs. F.G. O'Neill, also of Charlottetown, is a niece. The new church is expected to be opened next month.

Campbell Sees PM Remaining

The position of Prime Minister Pearson as leader of the Liberal Party in the light of the present controversy over party leadership in Canada, may be examined at the national liberal convention in Ottawa next week.

Premier Alex Campbell yesterday stated: "If the matter of leadership comes up at all, I would expect that the convention would express its full confidence in Mr. Pearson as national leader of the Liberal party."

It is understood that an Island delegation of 39 to this convention will sponsor a resolution relating to assurance of maintaining a transport link between the Island and the mainland.

The Premier said that representatives of the Liberal Party from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, have collaborated in presentation and support of resolutions dealing with rail transportation, university education, medicare, the Atlantic Development Board, and other matters of mutual interest to the Atlantic provinces.

The conference will consist mainly of workshop study groups on matters of policy.

The Premier will be accompanying the Island delegation although much of his time while in Ottawa will be spent on government business with private talks scheduled with the Prime Minister, minister of national defense, minister of agriculture, the minister of labor and others.
