NOTES ON THE NEWS.

"The tumult and the shouting dies"—at least we are to believe so if we accept the statements of the London correspondents. The white heat of excitement has cooled and the English people are reflecting that the danger of a war with France never amounted to much.

The last of the excitement of the public found vent in the welcoming home of the British troops and the reception of General Kitchener. The modest way in which the Sirdar accepted all his congratulations is decidedly refreshing when we consider the fuss and feathers that has been exhibited over some other generals not many thousand miles away, who have returned home as heroes after having performed far less heroic services.

But in France there is bad feeling over the withdrawal of Major Marchand. One cannot help feeling sorry for the brave man who when the Sirdar asked him at Fashoda what he would do if he (the Sirdar) attempted to remove him by force, replied: "Then in that case I must accept the inevitable and die at my post."

There was a great deal of talk about a cartoon published in Punch which was said to have made the French people very angry. It represented an organ grinder with a monkey playing outside John Bull's house. John comes to the door with a most disagreeably cross expression on his face and says to the organ grinder: "Go away, Go away."

There must have been something very irritating about this cartoon for a Dr. Russell of Manchester, was fined at the Mansion House, London, for breaking the plate glass window of the office of Punch which he said he did as a protest against blackguard cartoon, which was exhibited there.

The latest of the sensational rumors is that with regard to the fortifying of St. Pierre and its probable use as a naval base by the French navy whence the ships might make attacks upon Canadian cities. Charlottetown even was mentioned as likely to be captured. Our readers may make themselves easy in this regard. So far as the fortifications of St. Pierre are concerned they amount to very little. The island is said to be unsuitable for a naval base. And even if the French should secure the mastery of the Gulf and attempt the capture of Charlottetown have we not the battery of three 32-pounders at Fort Edward, the ramp newly planked and the stones and spikes taken out of the guns. Let the Frenchmen come and make the acquaintance of Nos. 1 and 2 Companies 4th P. E. I. Regt. of R. C. A.

In a few days probably there will be other sensations in France for all the world to talk about. The installation of the Dupuy ministry, the reopening of the Dreyfus case—there is probably no foundation for the report that Dreyfus is dead—and the peculiar tactics now being practiced by the Bonapartists together with the looming up of Prince Louis Napoleon form a combination from which we may expect any number of surprises.

In China the Chinese officials are punishing their soldiers for killing English engineers, in Crete the Turkish officials are

hanging Turkish troops for killing English soldiers and sailors, and because all the powers have a finger in the pie in both of these places, the disturbances can not be put down. "Union is strength" will not do for a motto for the united European powers.

ELECTION PROSPECTS.

The Montreal Star discusses the question Will there be an election? and concludes.—

An unexpected appeal to the country with a treaty in its hand, would undoubtedly have made attractions for this Ministry. They might get the people so interested in the pending treaty that they would forget for the moment the increased expenditure, the mounting debt, the member of Parliament appointed to office, the Drummond County and Teslin Lake proposals, the tales from the Yukon, business is business, and all the rest of it. It would be a pretty trick to play if it were carried off with enough nerve and noise. Precisely as the Republicans asked the American people to vote for them, and thus show Europe that they supported the Administration in the late war, so could the Liberals insist that the Canadian people must vote for their candidates and thus convince the Americans that they really and truly wanted the treaty that had just been written.

Still there is, at least, one possible snag in the way. The treaty may not come up to their expectations. In that case, it would not serve as a convenient cover for a multitude of sins. Consequently, it would be unwise to make up their minds to a dissolution before the conference is over; but it would be equally foolish to go through all the worry of a set of bye-elections if a dissolution was among the possibilities.

It will be just as well, therefore, not to be too sure of another session until we get it. If the session is abandoned, however, it will be a true sign of panic; for the party will be very reluctant to risk the privilege of spending another year's supply.

In any case it will be well for all these who think it is time for a change to stand prepared.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES

Montreal Gazette: A friendly feeling towards Great Britain is now reported in German official, military, and naval circles. The isolation in which the tight little island found itself a few years ago was splendid, all right; but today's kindly camaraderie is more comfortable.

Halifax Herald: Mr. Yeo will make a very good Senator, but all the same Mr Mulock must be very angry at this continued appointment of members of Parliament to office. So far, in a little over two years, we have had (counting Mr Yeo) eleven members of the House of Commons and three senators appointed to office. And if report speaks truly there are about thirty other members of the House of Commons with promises of office in their pockets. And no doubt sixty more trying to get promises. The scramble for office in the grip party today surpasses in interest any football match that ever was played.

THE UNQUIET SEX.

New Brunswick Women Petitioning for the Right to Vote.

The Women's Enfranchisement Association in New Brunswick is circulating the following petition:

"That, whereas, the exercise of the franchise has been a great factor in the civilization of men; and

"Whereas, many feel it an injustice to deprive women of the benefits accruing from the franchise; and

"Whereas, women everywhere are showing an increasing interest in the affairs of state; and

"Whereas, the franchise as exercised by women in several parts of the British Empire has already proved beneficial to the state, and has stimulated in electrical advancement of the women of these countries;

"Therefore, believing that equally with men, women are citizens as responsible to the law and as interested in all questions of public welfare, and taxation, war and peace, public sanitation and sobriety, and recognizing that the right to the ballot depends not on what one thinks, or says, or does, or is, and that the only bar to this right should be the disabilities that now debar men; your petitioners pray that you will enact a law during the present session of the Legislature giving full parliamentary suffrage to women on the same terms as those now enjoyed by men."

—The Toronto Globe is often wrong; but it is right in calling our men little tax on commercial travellers. "An Unwise Law." Speaking of the Ancillary Act past last session The Globe says:

"The Legislature is clearly doing a wrong. Even assuming that it has the right to collect the tax, it has no right to release the debtor because the creditor has not complied with a law which does not affect the debtor in any way. In other words, if the creditor owes the Province \$15 that is no reason why the debtor should not pay the \$100 which he owes to the creditor. In general we are opposed to Federal interference with Provincial laws, but we think that Prince Edward Island legislation on it to be very closely scrutinized at Ottawa before it is allowed to become law.

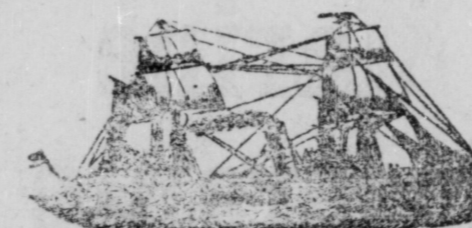

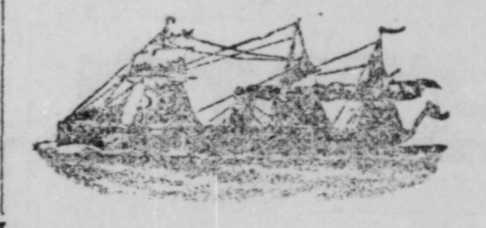
